

## Holy Cross Schedules Marian Year Pilgrimage

More than 700 parishioners of Holy Cross parish, Rochester, are expected to make the Marian Year Pilgrimage on Sunday, September 19. Chartered buses will leave the church at 2 p.m. to visit three outstanding churches dedicated to the Blessed Virgin. Stops will be made at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church on Joseph Ave., at Old St. Mary's on South St., and finally at Immaculate Conception Church on Plymouth Avenue South.

The Rev. J. Joseph O'Connell, pastor, will be accompanied by Fathers John P. O'Malley and William L. Reed and lead the rosary on the route.

AT EACH of the churches, the Marian Year Prayer composed by Pope Pius XII will be recited and other prayers in honor of the Blessed Virgin.

Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be given at Immaculate Conception Church. The Pilgrimage will actually begin Sunday morning when parishioners will receive Holy Communion and hear a sermon in honor of the Holy Mother of God.

Members of the Holy Name Society, Rosary Society, Sodality, Xavier and Christopher Clubs are promoting the program for all parishioners and friends.

## Edward J. Doyle Secures Patent On 'Singing Blade'

Edward J. Doyle, a graduate of Nazareth Hall and old Cathedral High in Rochester, has officially patented his "singing blade" after a four year wait.

Doyle, who resides at 270 Pelham Rd., Brighton, has a bowling and billiard supply firm two doors from the Courier-Journal offices on Sio St. He produced a singing blade which would reach almost three octaves through the construction of two electronic devices.

His interest in the singing blade developed through interest in the old musical saw. The finished product is a blade of steel, 29 inches long, six inches wide at one end and narrowing to less than two inches at the other. It's razor thin.

A musician in his own right, Doyle is a graduate of the Syracuse Conservatory of Music. Although he has never considered playing music professionally, he has given concerts with his musical blade, the most notable of which was when he was featured in a St. Patrick's Eve Pop Concert in Eastman Theater in 1952.
