

New Faculty Members Named At St. John Fisher College

Appointments of three new members of the faculty at St. John Fisher College were announced today by the Rev. John P. O'Meara, C.S.B., Ph.D., dean. They are: The Rev. Edmund Joseph McCorkell, C.S.B., L.L.D., who will be Professor of English; the Rev. Wilfred John Dwyer, C.S.B., Ph.D., named Professor of Philosophy; and the Rev. Alphonse Malone, C.S.B., who will be instructor in Psychology.

FATHER McCORKELL has just completed a term as Superior General of the Basilian Fathers' religious community of men. The Basilian Fathers staff Aquinas Institute and St. John Fisher College in Rochester, St. Michael's College in Toronto, Canada; Assumption College in Windsor, Canada; The Pontifical Institute of Medieval Studies at St. Michael's College, Toronto; St. Thomas More College in Saskatoon, Sask.; St. Thomas University in Houston, Texas; high schools and parishes in Canada and the United States as well as conducting mission work in Texas.

Father McCorkell has had 25 years of college teaching experience.

FATHER DWYER received his B.A. in Philosophy from the University of Western Ontario; his M.A. in English from the University of Rochester; and his doctorate in Philosophy from the University of Louvain.

He has had 17 years' experience in college teaching in the field of Philosophy. He is a member of the American Philosophical Society.

His publications include: *Siger de Brabant and the Problems of the Eternity of the World* (New Scotland, Louvain).

FATHER MALONE received his B.A. in Philosophy from the University of Western Ontario; his M.A. in Philosophy from the University of Toronto and is presently a doctoral candidate in Psychology at Fordham University.

Father Malone is a member of the American Philosophical Association and the American Catholic Philosophical Association.

His publications include: *Variability of Pain Threshold in the Neurotic and Psychoneurotic and The Effects of Brightness on the Spectral Locations of the Invariable Hue*.

George Heisel Retires From Police Force

Traffic Inspector George IV. Heisel, 69, first president of the Police Holy Name Society and a charter member of the Nocturnal Adoration Society, will retire from the Rochester police force on Oct. 8 to join his son George S. Heisel in the operation of the National Ambulance and Oxygen Service Inc.

A member of the force for 48 years, Heisel is formerly of St. Peter and Paul Parish and is now a member of Good Counsel Parish, Rochester, where he is a member of the Men's Club.

He is also a member of the First Friday Luncheon Club, of which his son, the Rev. Raymond G. Heisel, assistant pastor of St. Andrew Parish, is moderator. He lives at 87 Roskild St.

Heisel, who joined the force on March 18, 1906, is the senior member of the Police Bureau in point of service. He has long played a leading role in the city's fight to keep its traffic accident toll at a minimum.

In 1936 Heisel became one of the first policemen to attend the Traffic Officer's Training School at Harvard University.

Two years later he helped organize the Accident Prevention Bureau (now Division). The unit had one auto then; today, with eight cars and much equipment, it is one of the Police Bureau's most important divisions. He now heads both the Accident Prevention Division and the city's traffic squad.

Byzantine Rite Gains in Canada

Cap De La Madeleine, Que. (INC) — When thousands of pilgrims to the National Marian congress here had an opportunity of assisting at a Pontifical Mass in the Byzantine Rite, it came as a revelation to many of them that there are in Canada some 350,000 Catholics of the Byzantine Rite.

In the last 10 years the number of priests of the rite in Canada has risen from 61 to over 300. Most of the people in the rite in Canada are Ukrainians; some are Rumanians and Slovaks. In 1948 Pope Pius XII named three additional Bishops giving a total of one Archbishop and four Bishops to look after the spiritual needs of the Catholics of the Byzantine Rite in Canada.

Cardinal Named Franciscan Protector

Vatican City (RNS) — His Eminence Gaetano Cardinal Cicognani, Prefect of the Sacred Congregation of Rites, has been named Protector of the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Francis of Assisi by Pope Pius XII.

The Third Order nuns were founded at Allegany, N. Y., in 1859 by Father Pamphilus de Magliano, O.F.M., and still have their motherhouse there. Devoted to teaching and nursing, the Sisters work in dioceses throughout the United States and mission areas in Brazil and Jamaica, B.W.I.

The regional seminary here has been host to hundreds of Chinese priests and seminarians who have escaped the Red persecution. Some have passed on to Manila and Perang, an island in the Malay Union. Others, like these nine, who come from eight different provinces of China, have remained to finish their courses of philosophy and theology here.

All the newly ordained priests will receive assignments on the rim of communist China, awaiting the day they can return to their home diocese.

Soviet Press Spurs Attack On Religion

London (RNS) — Major news papers in the Soviet Union have begun an intensified drive against religion.

The Literary Gazette and Pravda, official Communist Party organ, launched the campaign with simultaneous editorials demanding more anti-religious activity.

TRUD, the trade union news paper, then joined the attack with a demand that the government close down a shrine near Moscow that attracts thousands of believers to the "healing waters" of its spring.

Pravda called for an unyielding campaign against religion. It said Communist organizations should use scientific and atheistic propaganda to show believers the error of their ways "without insulting the feelings of believers."

Revival of the anti-religious campaign comes at a time when the Party is worrying about a religious revival among some sections of Soviet youth. Pravda expressed special concern about children and religion.

THE Literary Gazette charged that farmers were neglecting their work for religious observances, thus obstructing the vital harvest.

It complained that farmers in the Kirov Oblast (Province) recently abandoned their cattle and fields of ripe grain for a three-day religious festival which, it said, was "only an excuse for drinking." The paper added that the Communist Party organization in the area had given permission for the festival.

TRUD complained that members of the Soviet "aristocracy" were among the thousands visiting Glinkovo near Moscow to bathe in what believers regard as sacred waters.

Publisher Dies
Muenster, Germany (INC) — Anton Hueffler, dean of Germany's Catholic publishers, has died here at the age of 97. He headed the publishing house of Aschendorf, which has been owned by the same family for more than 230 years.
