THE poet speaking of evil said: "We first endure, then pity, then embrace." Our world has become so calloused to cruelty that it remains indifferent to the swallowing up of one nation after another, from Poland to Indochina. We are apt to forget that Poland is full of Poles and Indo-China full of Indochinese, and each with an immortal soul.

Take for example one of our missionaries in China. This priest spent 933 days and 934 nights in a Communist prison. The faithful of his parish pleaded for his release. The Communists put them in a cell adjoining his so he could hear their cries while they were being tortured. For seven consecutive months he was accused by Communist judges, and for six days and nights with wrists chained behind his back without a moment's rest, was accused of various crimes by relays of Communist judges. Because he refused to confess being a murderer, they beat him with rods. Later on they would pull the sheets off his bed at night to see if his hands were folded in prayer. He unravelled threads from his bed clothes and knotted them in a rosary which was never found. As they beat him he would say: "I offer this for the Church in China."

In the name of Christ Who is Crucified on a Hammer and Sledge, do some violence to yourself; deny yourself a luxury, even a necessity, set into your capital, do something to bear in your body the fellowship with Christ suffering in His Church. Bell Tower To Be Memorial To Msgr. Walter S. Carroll

The memory of the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Walter S. Carroll who served the Church brilliantly on three continents will be honored in Pittsburgh on Oct. 31, according to NCWC News Service.

A young American priest whose late parents were known in Rochester and whose two uncles, John and Thomas Carroll, resided here before their deaths, Monsignor Carroll was a priest of the Diocese of Pittsburgh who was called to Rome to serve in the Vatican Secretariate of State.

THE HONOR will be the solemn blessing of the Monsignor Walter S. Carroll Memorial Bell Tower, a part of the renowned Sacred Heart Church in Pittsburgh on which celebrated artists have worked for the last 30 years.

While in the Vatican Secretariate of State his labors embraced the years of World War 2 and he carried out weighty and delicate assignments for the Holy See in Europe, Africa and America.

He died early in 1950, at the age of 41 years in Washington, D. C.

The memorial bell tower, was erected through gifts made by friends in all parts of the United States and in many other countries. It was decided to erect it at Sacred Heart Church, because of the unusual associations his family has with the parish.

A brother, Bishop Coleman F. Carroll, Auxiliary of Pittsburgh, is pastor of Sacred Heart parish, and another brother, Msgr. Howard J. Carroll, General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare


