Liszt's Lost Waltz Found
Byrna Maw, Pa. (NC)—A recently discovered piano manuscript of the 19th century composer and piano virtuoso Franz Liszt, who became a cleric at 34, will be published here by Theodore Presser Company.
This manuscript, the forgotten Waltz No. 4 is the last of a set of four forgotten waltzes, composed by Liszt after he received minor orders in Rome.
Liszt was in the habit of giving his manuscripts to his friends and students. And the manuscript of this waltz was found on the death of one of his students.

Two-Day Jubilee Slated For Knights

To mark the 75th anniversary of the formation of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John, fitting church and civic ceremonies are arranged for Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 11 and 12.

The two day celebration of the Diamond Jubilee offers the following program: At 8:30 Saturday morning, the Regiment will form in Franklin Square to march to St. Joseph's Church, where a Memorial High Mass for deceased members of the Rochester Regiment will be celebrated.

On Sunday morning at 8:15 a.m. the Regiment in Full Dress uniform accompanied by Uniformed Ladies Drill Teams will again form in Franklin Square. The line of the march will be through Cumberland St., Clinton North, Main Street East, North Street, and Franklin Street to St. Joseph's Church. Here at 9 a.m. His Excellency Bishop Kearney will pontificate at a Solemn Mass of Thanksgiving. Following the Mass, the Regiment will parade to Franklin Square, where the colors will be passed in review before dismissal.

The Powers Hotel Ballroom will be the scene of the Diamond Jubilee Banquet, Sunday at 6 p.m. Officers of the Supreme Commandery and of the New York Grand Commandery will be the guests of honor and the speaker will be His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey.

OTHER EVENTS to take place during the Jubilee year include the exemplification of the Second and Third Degrees in September, the Annual Pilgrimage to the Shrine of North American Martyrs, sponsored by the New York Grand Commandery in October, the Annual Corporate Communion of the Regiment at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church on Oct. 31 and exemplification of the Fourth Degree in November.

The knights of St. John Regiment down through its 75 years of existence has a distinguished record of church, military and civic achievements.
Actual date of organization of the regiment was June 13, 1879 according to a brief historical sketch appearing in the September issue of Rochester Reporter, the regiment's publication.
THIS DATE marked the initial meeting of number of representatives from various Catholic Uniformed Societies, then affiliated with several parishes in Rochester.



Colonel George A. Begy was marshal of a parade that welcomed the late Bishop Bernard McQuaid on his return to Rochester from a visit to Rome. Such a creditable showing was made by the uniformed groups, that Colonel Begy, Colonel Louis Ernst and others called a meeting of the various units which resulted in the formation of the Roman Catholic Uniformed Union of Rochester.
Shortly after this the Union affiliated themselves with the newly organized National Order of the Knights of St. John and later became the First Regiment of the Knights of St. John with headquarters in Rochester.

During three quarters of a century, nine men have served as Colonels of the Rochester Regiment. Of these, two received signal honors from the Holy Father. The late Colonel Joseph H. Wels, K.S.G. received the Papal honor of membership in the Knights of St. Gregory. On the late Colonel Frank H. Biel was conferred the Papal designation of Knight of the Holy Sepulchre.

Colonel Biel also served as Supreme President of the Knights of St. John, the only Colonel of the local Regiment to be so honored.
THE PRESENT Colonel of the Rochester Regiment is Emil G. Eckert. John G. Bittner is lieutenant Colonel and also served

English Teacher Of Deaf To Preach In Rochester

Very Rev. W. J. Canon Hayward of Manchester, England will say Mass and preach to the Catholic deaf and their families and friends in St. Francis de Sales Deaf Chapel on Sunday, Sept. 19, at 8:15 a.m. Following Mass breakfast will be served in the hall.

Canon Hayward has dedicated his holy calling completely to the service of the deaf of Great Britain for more than 25 years and his tireless efforts have won for him recognition and acclaim to be honored by the Holy Father with the title of Canon. He himself is deaf.

Canon Hayward lost his complete sense of hearing during his active service in World War I. Emerging from the war, he too had to adjust himself accordingly and eventually he became a qualified teacher of the deaf in Boston Spa, Yorkshire, England.

WHILE TEACHING the deaf he became a convert from Anglicanism to Catholicism. So strong became his attachment to the deaf during those years that he was conscious of one outstanding need—a priest for the deaf adult. Despite his auditory defect, he entered a seminary. After the usual seminary courses, he was ordained by special dispensation from Rome.

Canon Hayward came to this country as the guest of the International Catholic Deaf Association, of which the Rev. John B. Gallagher, C.S.S.R., Director of the Deaf of Rochester, is chaplain. His Bishop has given him a three-months leave of absence to observe the methods used in the United States for teaching the deaf.

Canon Hayward accepted appointment as Supreme Spiritual Adviser, Celebrant of a Solemn Pontifical Mass for the Regiment, Bishop Kearney was presented with a spiritual bouquet gathered from members serving in the armed forces throughout the world.

ONLY ONCE in the 75 years, the Noble Degree of the Holy Cross was exemplified. This took place when Bishop Kearney on May 9, 1948 conferred the degree on a class of 100 candidates in St. Joseph's Church, Rochester.
