

Nocturnal Adoration Unit Marks Silver Jubilee

Silver Jubilee of the diocesan Nocturnal Adoration Society which in 25 years has grown from 178 men to 2800 in the Rochester area and more observed at a Solemn Pontifical Mass, Tuesday, Sept. 21, at 8 p.m.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney who has encouraged the growth of the society—terming it a "spiritual power house"—will celebrate the Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Flower City Park at Primrose St.

Bishop Kearney Praises 25 Years Of Night Adoration

THE BISHOP will be assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay, Assistant Priest; the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, Deacon; the Very Rev. Gerald C. Lambert, Subdeacon; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas F. Connors and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George W. Eckl, Deacons of Honor to the Bishop and the Very Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, Master of Ceremonies.

An ecclesiastical procession will be held from the church to the rectory escorted by Nocturnal Adoration Society officers, past presidents and including 54 charter members.

Bishop Kearney will address the men at the conclusion of the Mass.

Frank E. Wolfe is general chairman of the Silver Jubilee program.

The Nocturnal Adoration Society members keep a one hour vigil before the Blessed Sacrament exposed, once a month in a designated church as an act of reparation in eight bands throughout the hours 10 to 6.

The Society here came into existence under the leadership of the late William G. Wynne among retreatants at St. Bernard's Seminary.

FIRST VIGIL in Lady Chapel of old St. Patrick's Cathedral with the encouragement of the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern was held on Sept. 28, 1929. The first moderator was Monsignor Shay at that time rector of the Cathedral.

The Society continued to grow in numbers gathering the fourth Saturday night of every month at Lady Chapel and after 1837 at St. Patrick's Church when Father Mooney, pastor, became moderator. From 1933 to 1937 the Society was given the approval of Archbishop-Bishop Edward Mooney.

Interest in the society continued to grow and in 1952 a second center was established at Blessed Sacrament Church. In June of last year four centers were established, one each in Sacred Heart Cathedral, St. Andrew's, Blessed Sacrament and St. Monica churches.

Moderators of the four centers comprising parishes in the area are: Sacred Heart Cathedral, His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey; St. Andrew's, Monsignor Eckl; Blessed Sacrament, Monsignor Connors and St. Monica's, Monsignor Lambert.

Formation of the Society in

the United States was put by Vatican authorities in the hands of the Blessed Sacrament Fathers, New-York City.

I am happy to extend sincere congratulations to the Nocturnal Adoration Society on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee of the organization in this diocese. When we think of twenty-five years in terms of all the hours of intense adoration of Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament we become conscious of the deeply spiritual significance of this Jubilee.

However, one of the most inspiring features of the Jubilee year is the recent expansion of the Society into new areas and the consequent multiplying of adorers of our Sacramental King. The prayers of these men ascending from different altars in a great source of spiritual help for the diocese and a majestic act of love for Jesus Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

God grant that this intense devotion to Our Lord in the tabernacle may increase year by year in the future as it has done for this blessed quarter of a century.

Cathedral High Reunion Slated

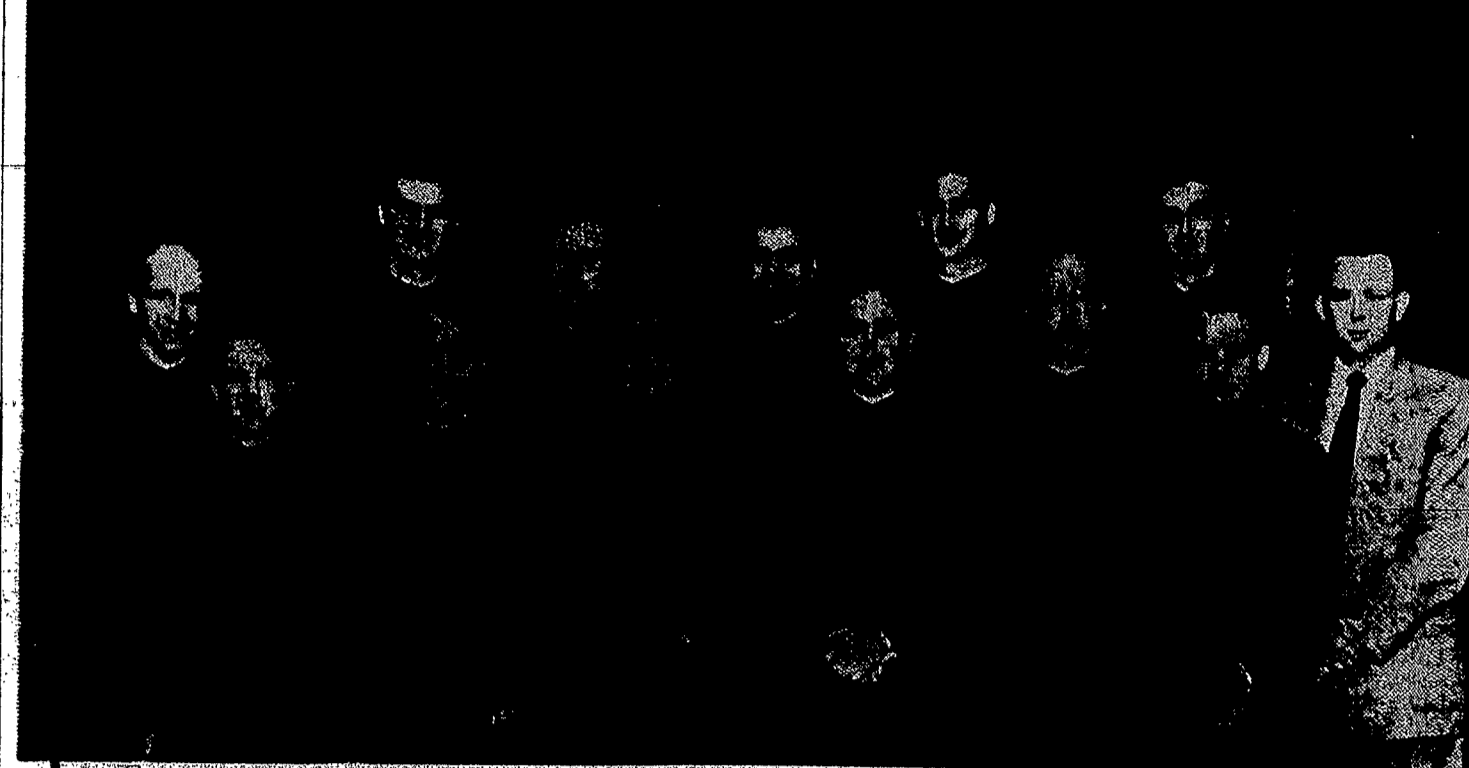

Penfield Parish Considering New Church, School

Preliminary plans are in the making for church and school buildings for St. Joseph's Parish, Penfield, to be erected on Gebaur Road, it was announced by the Rev. John D. Malley, pastor, today.

A census of the Penfield parish is now being conducted and development of the plans will be based on findings in the survey. Approximately 300 families in the growing Penfield section points, the need for a church and school building to take the place of the present structure on Penfield Road.

ARCHITECTS named are Wassbord and Northrup with Edward J. Ribson associated. Co-operating with Father Malley in working out plans for the parish expansion is the Rev. Joseph Maloney, assistant pastor. A campaign for funds will be conducted in February, Father Malley said.

Blessing Of Cornerstone Slated Sunday

Cornerstone of the new Bishop McQuaid Jesuit High School will be blessed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney at 3 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 19. Many noted dignitaries will be present for the occasion.

THE REV. THOMAS E. HENNEBERRY, S.J., provincial of the New York Province of the Society of Jesus, will represent the Jesuit order on the rostrum. The concluding address will be delivered by Bishop Kearney.

Others who will be present include the Rev. James R. Barnett, S.J., rector of the school; the Rev. Gerard F. Fagan, S.J., principal; Mayor Samuel B. Dicker, and Leonard A. Boniface, supervisor of Brighton.

A student group from the school temporarily in operation

at old Cathedral High School, will render instrumental and vocal selections including the National Anthem and two traditional hymns dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary. A reception and tour of the school will conclude the historic occasion.

New School Dedication Set Sunday In Newark

Newark — His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey will dedicate the new parochial school of St. Michael in Newark, Sunday, Sept. 19, at 3 p.m., according to the Rev. Henry J. Doerbecker, pastor.

The program will include blessing of the new school and new convent and a talk by the Bishop.

THE \$250,000 SCHOOL provides kindergarten and eight classrooms, but only the kindergarten and first four grades are presently enrolled. The remaining grades will be added one each year. Over 200 children are in attendance at this time.

The Newark Post, American Legion, will participate in the Dedication Program by presenting and raising the American flag.

AN ILLUSTRATED booklet reviewing the story of the building campaign and program will be given to those attending the ceremony. Men of the Holy Name Society and Knights of Columbus will serve as an Escort of Honor to the Bishop.

The school and convent will be open to the public for inspection following the dedication rite.

An invitation was extended to village, town, and public school teachers and officials to an open house at the school this past Thursday, Sept. 16.

Brighton Parish Awaits Town Board Decision On Site

Construction of a church and school for St. Thomas More parish, Brighton, awaits the decision of the Town's Planning Board, following a meeting this past Tuesday, Sept. 14.

THE PROPOSED buildings would be erected on a plot nearly 15 acres in extent on East Avenue between Georgian Court Road and Ambassador Drive. The land is known as the Drescher property. According to the Rev. Francis Pegnam, pastor, it is the geographic center for over 350 Catholic families in that area.

At the Board Meeting, some property owners of the neighborhood immediately adjacent to the proposed site protested that the area was a residential section and that a church and school would create traffic hazards and become a noise nuisance.

FATHER PEGNAM pointed out that the extent of the proposed site would enable the parish to provide its own parking facilities and that all parish activities would be at a considerable distance from the nearest homes.

Although the property is classified by Brighton as "Class A residential," Mr. David E. Shaver, attorney, cited Section 19 of the Brighton Zoning Ordinance which expressly states that religious and educational buildings may be erected in these Class A areas provided permission is obtained from the Town Planning Board.

The contemporary colonial style of the proposed parish structures would harmonize with the expensive homes of the area, Father Pegnam explained. He cited the fact that there is only one Catholic parish now in the Town of Brighton, Our Lady of Lourdes, and was established over twenty-six years ago.

THE RECENT and rapid suburban development in the Brighton area has left Catholics without adequate facilities for church or parochial schooling, Father Pegnam said.

Another spokesman for the parish at the Board Meeting commented, "Where else should we build a parish if not where the people live?" The decision of the Planning Board is expected to be announced within a month.
