## Six Room Addition Set By Penn Yan School

Penn Yan—St. Michael Parish in Penn Yan has awarded contracts for the construction of a six room addition to the parish school, according to the Rev. Francis C. Waterstraat, pastor.

Four bids totaling \$79,839 were awarded. Construction is expected to begin at once and to be completed in about five months. The addition will be connected to the present school by a corridor to make future expansion possible.

Cost of each new class room will be \$18,073. The project will cost 11-11 cents per square foot and 7 cents per cubic foot.

The addition to the present school will be of masonry construction with brick veneer, and have stone coping and trim. The sash will be aluminum and will extend from wall to wall in the classroom.

Ceilings will be of fireproof acoustical tile and floor covering of vinyl tile. There will be individual toilet rooms in the two lower grade rooms. Interior finish will be painted plaster block with lighting by fluorescent strip fixtures.



"Hasty, faddy, do-it-for-me, hastily said prayers are poorly said prayers, and to that extent they are a waste of time. Let us try to remember that God is our audience, giving our prayer his undivided attention as if it were the only prayer offered at that moment.

"Immediately we shall see that a hurried, inattentive prayer is out of place. It does not fit. It is an insult to our audience. A short attentive prayer, fervently said, is better by far than a long, heedless, distracted prayer."

## Apostleship Of Prayer Diocesan Director Named

The Rev. Louis J. Hohman, spiritual director of St. Andrew's Seminary was appointed Diocesan Director of the Apostleship of Prayer (League of the Sacred Heart) by His Excellency Bishop Kearney. It was announced this week.

Father Hohman will succeed the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph H. Gefeil, Chaplain of the Sisters of St. Joseph who has directed the movement for many years. "The goal of the Apostleship is the salvation of souls through devotion to the Sacred Heart," Father Hohman said today.

ORDAINED OCT. 18, 1946, in St. Ambrose Church by Bishop Kearney, Father Hohman's first appointment was as assistant pastor of St. Helen's Church, Gates. He was transferred on June 22, 1951, to assistant pastor of Blessed Sacrament Church and was named spiritual director of St. Andrew's Seminary June 26, 1953.

He has served as diocesan director of the Rochester Diocesan Council of Catholic Women and as director of the Thanksgiving Week Clothing Drive in the diocese for victims in war torn lands.

Through the Apostleship of Prayer, Father Hohman will foster three practices: the daily recitation of the morning offering; receiving Holy Communion weekly and adding to the morning offering, the daily recitation of the Rosary.
