

Waverly Girl Pronounces Final Vows in Buffalo

Waverly—Sister Mary Gerard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Barrett of 134 Howard St., Waverly, was one of 11 novices who pronounced her final vows as Sisters of St. Joseph at ceremonies at Mt. St. Joseph Chapel in Buffalo.

THE SPECIAL service was held Monday, August 30, and marked the final procession after six years of novitiate training. The Very Rev. Msgr. Eugene H. Selbert celebrated the Mass and received the vows from the sisters in the presence of relatives and friends.

Marcelline Barrett, sister of Sister Mary Gerard, was crown bearer for the ceremony. She carried a silver tray containing the 11 crowns of roses which the sisters wore, after having received them from Msgr. Selbert.

BEFORE ENTERING the convent, Sister Mary Gerard was graduated from Waverly High School in 1944 and from Our Lady of Victory Institute in Lackawanna. For the past two years, she has been teaching the first grade at the parochial school in Medina and will resume her duties there this fall.


"All of us, in some way, are responsible for a life that goes wrong," Hogan said.

A class of 32 young women, including 11 from Elmira, entered St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing, Elmira Sunday afternoon to begin a three-year training course.

Registration, assignment of rooms in the nurses' residence, and an informal reception for students and their parents was held from 3 to 5 p.m. In charge of refreshments were members of St. Joseph's Hospital Women's Auxiliary including Mrs. John Murtagh, Mrs. Timothy McCarthy, and Mrs. William Kelsey.

The opening week's schedule includes a meeting Monday morning with Sister Anne Maurice, director of the School of Nursing, and a guided tour of the hospital with faculty members in the afternoon; introductory classes and an evening party with "Big Sisters" of the junior class Tuesday, and the formal school opening at a Mass Wednesday morning at 7:30 in the Little Flower Chapel.

Celebrant of the Mass will be the Rev. Benedict Ehmman, pastor of the Church of St. Mary of the Lake at Watkins Glen, who will speak at a Communion breakfast which will follow in the nurses' cafeteria.

ON THURSDAY, GROUP of class representatives will attend a convocation for freshmen nursing students from all schools in the Rochester regional area, to be held at Rochester Museum of Arts and Sciences. The speaker will be Miss Mary Roberts, editor emerita of the "American Journal of Nursing," who will speak on "Nursing Horizons."

New St. James School Opened With 111 Pupils

Waverly—The new St. James School which will be officially dedicated on Sunday, Oct. 10 when His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey will also administer the Sacrament of Confirmation, opened its doors Wednesday morning to 111 children.

Directly after a Mass celebrated by the Rev. G. Stuart Hogan, pastor, at 9 a.m., the children were led in grades by the Sisters of St. Joseph through the wide corridors into unusually large classrooms.

Although the furniture had not yet arrived, folding chairs were in place for the children. Thirty-six children make up the first grade, 38 the second, 20 the third and 17 the fourth.

IN THE \$125,000 structure are six classrooms, each measuring 24 by 32 feet, which is larger than the usual room. Outstanding features are the long bank of windows in each room, the cloakrooms having both an exit and an entrance, and the tile floors.

Glassbrick work has been used to separate the interior door from the exterior on all the exits, and it is used at the top of each classroom facing the corridor.

Radiators have been placed in each room under the entire bank of windows. The boiler is oil-fired and automatic.

THE AMERICAN flags which are in each classroom are the gift of Miss Mary Falsie, retired principal of the Lincoln Street school, Waverly, who gave \$100.00 as a memorial. Carl Ames, Constance and James Walden, in second, third and fourth grades respectively, and Roberts, Dolores and George Tuccinardi in first, second and third grades, represent families with the highest number of pupils in the school. The Tuccinardi children of Chemung, N. Y., are also the only pupils coming from out of town.
