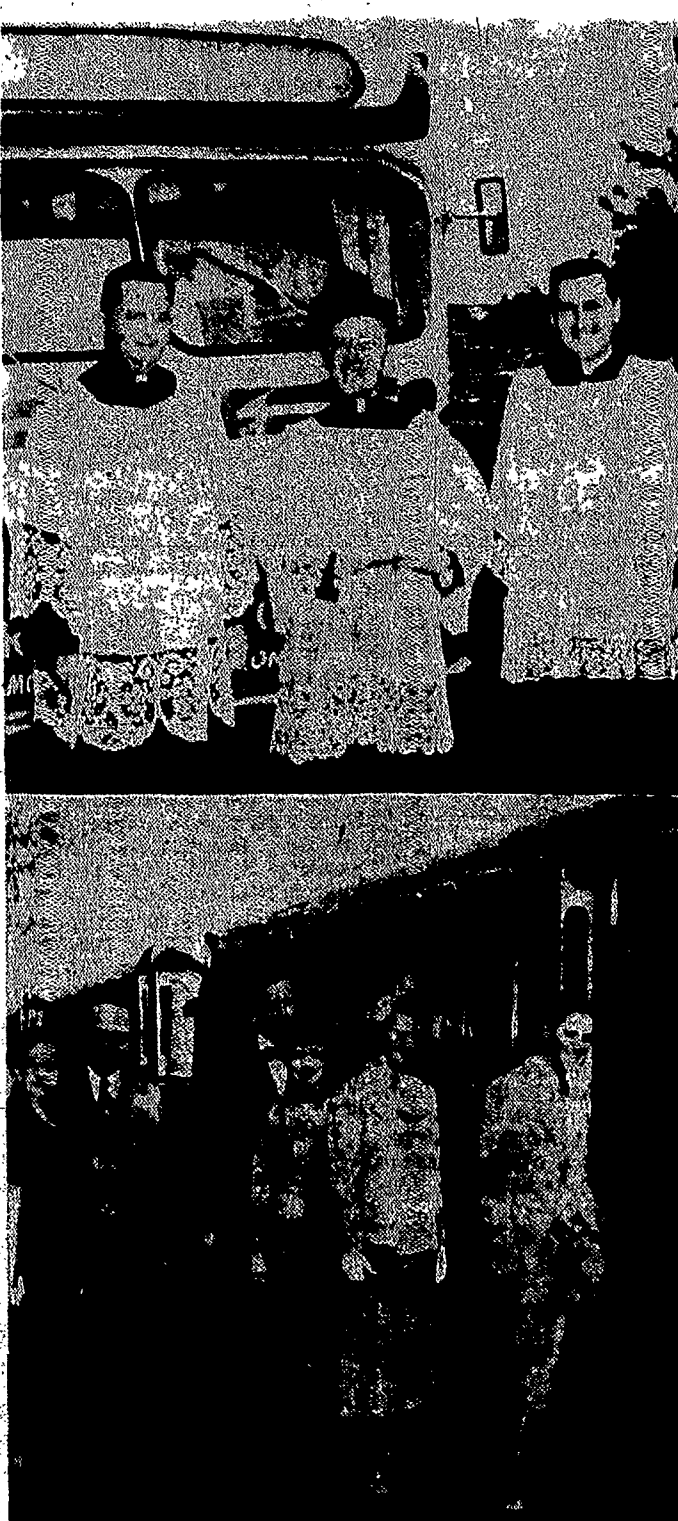
Rites Held For Sister Verona

Catholic Women's Club Marks Opening Of Annual Membership Drive Tonight

Luncheon at the Chatterbox Club on Friday, Sept. 24, marks the opening of the annual membership drive of the Catholic Women's Club under the chairmanship of Mrs. Clarence J. Brauch. Over 50 of its members will gather to begin work of solicitation of new members from among the Catholic women of Rochester. The campaign will continue until Oct. 15.

The purpose of the Club being one essentially of service—religious, cultural, charitable, and social—to the community and the diocese, a variety of opportunity is open for volunteer service in civic projects. Co-sponsored by the Club of Old Age Groups in seven centers in Rochester demands club volunteers, as does the Youth Protection Group interested in playgrounds, police women, decent literature and similar needs for young people.

WORKERS INTERESTED in young people will also find a need in the growing program for Girl Scouts sponsored by the club. For more than 30 years, the club has sponsored and maintained Camp Madonna on Canandaigua Lake. Here, 150 girls between the ages of 8 and 14 each summer enjoy camp life for two-week periods. Scholarships maintained by the club at Catholic girls' high schools benefit at least three Rochester girls each year.

Civilian defense Registrations, March of Dimes, American Red Cross activities, trial vaccine polio tests, and various city projects are among those which find willing volunteers among the members. While one group makes bandages for a medical mission in Africa, another sews and collects clothing for a Negro mission in North Carolina and an Indian mission in South Dakota, and still another finances a monthly movie program for St. Anne Home.

MANY MEMBERS find it pleasant to meet in various interest groups. The Young Mothers' Group has meetings every second Wednesday evening, featuring programs of mutual help and social benefit to these young women.

Any career woman enjoys the Business Women's Group which meets on the fourth Tuesday for dinner and a stimulating program. Several Fridays throughout the year find another group of women meeting for a bridge luncheon.

These group meetings, as well as the regular monthly Club meetings with varied programs are held in the 34-year-old Alexander St. club house.

Mrs. Brauch pointed out that membership in the Club makes one a part of all this worthwhile work and affords the privilege of sharing not only in the social, civic, and charitable activities, but such religious experiences as the annual spring weekend Retreat at the Canisius Convent, the annual Day of Recollection at the Sacred Heart Convent on the Feast of Christ the

King in October, and the annual communion breakfast in November at a downtown hotel, to which an outstanding American laywoman is invited as guest speaker.
