

### Communism Hit By Speaker At Seminary

One of the difficulties about dealing with communism in America is that many Americans do not understand that it is not a party, but a conspiracy. This William C. Kernan of Fordham University School of General Studies, declared in an address, "Communism in American Education," delivered on Sept. 26 to students of St. Bernard Seminary.

The lecture was presented under the joint auspices of the Dante Society of the Seminary and the St. Bernard Alumni Association.

Kernan, formerly an Episcopal minister, was received into the Catholic Church in 1952. Previous to that he had been actively engaged, in the field of lecturing, radio and television, as a crusader for human rights. As a member of the non-sectarian Scarsdale Citizens Committee, he has been, and continues to be, active in exposing communist infiltration in the public schools of Scarsdale.

QUOTATIONS FROM the leaders of Marxist communism, from Lenin and Stalin to William J. Foster, show up clearly the Communist philosophy and the campaign based upon it. Mr. Kernan said, "For the Communist, he explained, history is a constant struggle in which the lower classes rise against the upper classes and displace them by revolution."

The last of these struggles is now under way, they maintain; the struggle in which the working classes throughout the world are rising to dethrone "capitalism" and all that goes with it.

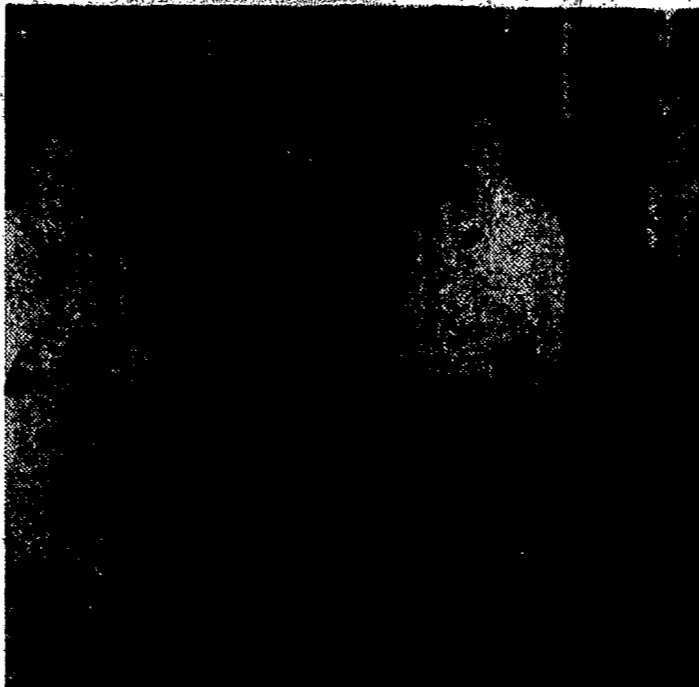
Uniformed knights and ladies are urged to bring their uniforms and provision will be made to change into their uniforms at Auriesville.

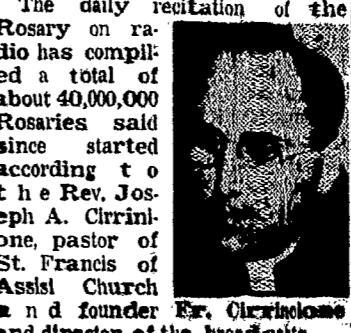

### Ten Million Rosaries Set For 5th Year Goal

With a goal set at 10,000,000 Rosaries during the fifth year on the air, the Family Rosary for Peace heard each night at 7 p.m. on WSAJ will make its annual appeal for funds during the month of October.

The daily recitation of the Rosary on radio has compiled a total of about 40,000,000 Rosaries said since started according to the Rev. Joseph A. Cirincione, pastor of St. Francis of Assisi Church and founder, Fr. Cirincione and director of the broadcast.

According to the latest Hopscotting, based on a poll made in July Rochester's Family Rosary For Peace had the second largest audience of any radio station in the city on Monday through Friday. It was only slightly behind another city station.

The appeal for funds is made by mail to a list of friends and patrons who have supported the project in the past. They are asked to be subscribers or sponsors of the program. Any others are welcome to join in the program.

GOAL OF THE campaign is \$16,000, the amount needed to operate for one year. This includes not only radio time but various expenses such as the cost of the appeal by mail, pictures, scapulars and booklets given away during the year, clerical help and other items.

This year, the sponsors will receive a beautiful colored picture of St. Pius X with his autograph in gold, suitable for framing. These were obtained by Father Cirincione while in Rome at the time of the canonization.

Both His Excellency Bishop Kearney who encouraged the start of the program four years ago and His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey have appeared on the program and are giving it their support.

In the appeal, associate sponsors are asked to give \$2.00; Family sponsors, \$5.00 and sustaining sponsors, \$10.00 or more. The address is the Family Rosary For Peace 401 Orange St., Rochester 11, N.Y.

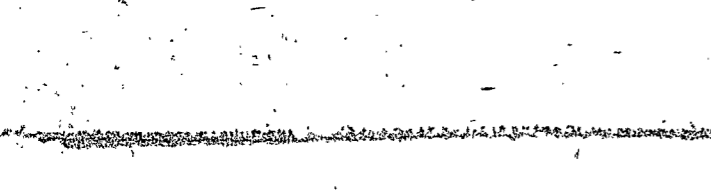
