GOD LOVE YOU!

His past week these were some of our sorrows and some of our joys. Since the Treaty of Geneva dividing Indo-China and giving the North to the Communists, we know definitely of 25 missionaries already in prison. The Bishops of the Diocese in Communist territory, as good shepherds, refuse to leave their suffering sheep. . . . One of our mission territories is 25 miles from Eastern Siberia; the Diocese there is only two miles long and a half a mile wide. Of the 100 persons on it, 75 are Catholic. Russia will not allow anyone on the nearby islands to associate with them. . . . An expert was called in by the Kenya government to study the Mau Mau who in the EMBU district burned 40 schools, killed 15 teachers. The conclusion was that there was not enough religion and morality taught in the schools. American educators might apply this solution to our juvenile "Mau Mau" . . . Communists in China now have an "investiture ceremony" for 8,000,000 youths who have passed the Party Test. The symbol is a red scarf; on accepting, the youth swears: "I shall study and work well, devote myself to manual labor and will always be ready to fight for the Communist cause." Today there are less than 130 foreign missionaries in China. Of that number, three Bishops and 29 priests are in prison; most of the others are under house arrest.

"On the Road to Mandalay" you will now find a native Burmese Bishop who has two brothers priests. . . . Incidentally, you can educate a native boy for the priesthood for \$150 a year, or \$750 for the entire course. . . . This is peculiar: Some Catholics of Nagasaki who kept the faith amid persecution since the 16th century, and were without priests until the 19th century, now refuse to accept missionaries as successors to their priests. They are known in Japan as "HANARE" or the "Separated" and number a little more than 30,000. The latter do the baptism and hold religious services.

These are just a few of the lands the Holy Father has to aid. Why not send him some sacrifice to aid his 100,000 missionaries in 650 areas throughout the world. You send him the sacrifice through the Society for the Propagation of the Faith, which is his own missionary society.

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Dedication Set Sunday To Open New St. James School In Waverly

Waverly — Invitations have been issued to the parishioners and friends of St. James Church in Waverly to attend the dedication of the new parochial school by His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey, on Sunday afternoon.

Following Confirmation ceremonies and Benediction in the church at 1:30 p.m., Bishop Casey, the clergy, altar boys, members of the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, War Dads and Boy and Girl Scouts will move in procession to the flag pole. Under the direction of the American Legion and V.F.W., the flag will be raised and dedicated.

Then moving from room to room, the Bishop will dedicate the rooms of the school—the culmination of the dreams and hopes of the parishioners, and the single-minded devotion of the Rev. G. Stuart Hogan, who assumed the pastorage of St. James five years ago.

WHEN THE SCHOOL opened its doors on Wednesday morning Sept. 8, 115 children followed the Sisters of St. Joseph, headed by the superior and principal, Sister Matilda, into the modern brick building which was erected at a cost of \$120,000.

On Sunday, for the first time, the public will see the interior of the building, striking features of which are the light and colorful color scheme, spacious halls, extra large classrooms, wide banks of windows permitting an abundance of natural lighting supplemented by banks of fluorescent lights overhead, and a new type of radiant heating stretching the full length of the window wall.

Ground was broken on Dec. 8, 1953, with the main part of the school being completed in the spring and summer just past.

100 Priests Attend Rites For Msgr. George V. Burns

Two Bishops, 15 Monsignors and 90 priests of the diocese were present at the Solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass for the Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, founder and pastor emeritus of Sacred Heart Cathedral at the Cathedral, Thursday, Sept. 30.

Monsignor Burns died Sept. 27, 1954, at the age of 81 and in the 57th year of his priesthood.

Annual Scholarship Exams Announced By State KC

Eight college scholarships, five for boys and three for girls, will again be offered by the New York State Council, Knights of Columbus, to help defray tuition or other expenses in any Catholic college in the United States. It has been announced by Emmet Burke of 426 Park Avenue, Yorkers, chairman of the State K. of C. Scholarship Committee.

A candidate for the preliminary examination must be a Catholic, reside in New York State, and expect to graduate from a recognized four-year Catholic or public high school in either January or June 1955.

DEADLINE FOR applications will be Dec. 1, 1954. Blank forms are available in the high schools and local Councils of the Knights of Columbus or by writing Burke at the above address.

The scholarships are valued at \$1,600 each. They entitle the winners to receive \$400 each year. Awards will be made as the result of a series of two competitive examinations, the first to be conducted on Saturday morning, Jan. 15, 1955 under the direct auspices of the Knights of Columbus to determine the top three candidates from each of eight scholarship districts. The remaining 24 students will then take the College Entrance Examination Board tests on March 12, 1955, at which time the eight winners will be determined.

Examination centers are expected to be located in: Albany, Allegheny, Amsterdam, Auburn, Batavia, Binghamton, Buffalo, Dunkirk, Elmira, Glens Falls, Haverstraw, Jamestown, Kingston, Lockport, Lowville, Malone, Middletown, Mineola, Newburgh, New York City, Niagara Falls, Ogdensburg, Oswego, Poughkeepsie, Olean, Plattsburgh, Poughkeepsie, Rochester, Rockville Centre, Saranac Lake, Staten Island, Syracuse, Troy, Utica, Watertown, White Plains, Yorkers.

Additional centers will be arranged if the number of applicants from an area warrants it.

THE UNION officers prepared a critique of the summer school of Catholic Action, attended by some 175 sodalists of the diocese at Fordham University in August, following general discussion of the benefits of the annual week's school.
