

Ceremony Set Sunday For St. Louis School

His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, will break ground on Sunday, Oct. 10, for the new St. Louis School to be erected in Pittsford. The ceremony will take place at 5 p.m. on the E. Main Street site.

The 250 pupils of the present school will be present, along with their parents, parishioners, town officials and clergy. The general public and townspeople of Pittsford are invited.

The all male choir of the Rochester Gas and Electric Company will provide a musical background of several numbers selected for the occasion.

THE GROUND breaking ceremony inaugurates an extensive building program for St. Louis Parish which will include beside the eight-room school, a new parish church to be erected also on the Main Street site. On Thursday, Oct. 14, the general fund raising campaign will open with a kick-off dinner at Oak Hill Country Club to raise funds for the \$450,000 project. Robert E. Gilma, executive vice-president of R.G.E., is heading the drive, with Robert F. Schumacher as campaign manager. Walter E. Bull, chairman of special gifts, and Frank P. Fenwick, publicity director, will also be present at the dinner opening the fund raising campaign to give the inaugural address.

At the close of the ground breaking ceremonies on Sunday, parishioners and friends will be invited to view an oil portrait of the pastor emeritus of St. Louis, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Louis W. Egan. The painting by artist John C. Merrill was presented to the school by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Wason and is on exhibit in the Main Hall.

Bishop Brennan To Mark Jubilee

Bishop Andrew J. Brennan, retired Bishop of Richmond, Va., and a former student of St. Bernard Seminary, Rochester, will observe the 50th anniversary of his ordination on Dec. 17, just three days after his 77th birthday.

Bishop Brennan was appointed Auxiliary Bishop of Scranton and consecrated on April 25, 1923. He was named eighth Bishop of Richmond on May 28, 1928. Stricken ill in 1934, he remained as Bishop of Richmond until April 14, 1945, when he resigned.

For Printers' Prayers

80 Persons Participate In Opening The 1954-1955 Catholic Info Series

More than 80 interested inquirers joined the Rev. Albert Shamon and two priest companions at 8 p.m. last Monday in the Catholic Information Forum at Rochester's Seneca Hotel.

The evening's lecture was entitled "Our Search for God." It was an examination into our reasons for being sure of our Creator's existence.

A series of questions followed which probed such subjects as "How can a good God allow His creatures to suffer?"

THIS PROGRAM was the first in a series of twelve which are being held on successive Monday evenings in the meeting rooms of the downtown hotel.

The talks are sponsored and delivered by a group of priest-instructors from St. Andrew's Seminary.

Next week's Forum topic will be "God's Message" and will consist of an explanation of the Catholic Church's stand on Revelation.

Typical difficulties to be answered will include these: "Is it true that Catholics are not allowed to read the Bible itself but must be content with a digest called Bible History?" and "What does the Church mean by the term Tradition?"

"How does the Catholic hierarchy hope to prove its divine foundation from a book which derives its own proof from the Church?"

SPEAKER WILL be the director of the Forum and Professor of History at St. Andrew's, the Rev. Richard M. Quinn who is also Newman Club Chaplain at the Eastman School of Music.

These lectures are open to the public and are intended especially to supply information on Catholic beliefs and practices to inquiring non-Catholics.

Each evening's program begins at 8 p.m. with a one hour informal lecture which is followed by a period in which members of the audience are invited to present questions or problems publicly or privately to the several priests in attendance.

Future lectures will treat vital Catholic doctrine like the Divinity of Christ, the Mass, the Mother of God, Indulgences, etc.
