First step in the drive to raise a \$225,000 expansion building fund to enlarge their present convent and school will be taken Saturday by parishioners of Holy Cross Parish at a school auditorium. His Excellency Bishop Casey former Holy Cross pastor, will give the principal address.

Announcement of the need for additions to the school and convent was made several weeks ago by the pastor, the Rev. J. Joseph O'Connell.

Preliminary steps for the drive included naming chairmen and selection of survey committees and division leaders.

The drive is set for two weeks, Oct. 10 to 23, classified as advance gift solicitation. Oct. 10 to 13, general solicitation. Oct. 17 to 20, Campaign headquarters are at the school.

A full organization dinner scheduled for Saturday, Oct. 16, in the school auditorium, will be addressed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney.

THE EXPANSION: building plans include addition of 11 new classrooms and an overall program of making needed additional facilities for the convent.

Built in 1930, the school originally was intended for accommodation of pupil maximum of approximately 480. Today the registration is 672 and the census shows that in 1960, the enrollment will exceed 1000 pupils. The present school is a two-story brick structure with auditorium.

ARCHITECTS PLANS for the new additions show a modern design, one that will enhance the beauty of the present structure and make Holy Cross one of the outstanding parishes of the Diocese.

Father O'Connell is honorary chairman of the fund-raising campaign, with the Rev. John P. O'Malley and the Rev. William L. Reed, assistant pastors, as vice-chairmen.
