Father Pece, Former City Pastor, Dies

REV. ANTHONY PECE



The Rev. Anthony Pece, C.F.P.S., died in his hometown in Italy on Sept. 21, 1954 after a long illness according to word received here by the Rev. Sebastian Contigato, C.F.P.S., from his superior in Rome.

Father Anthony was the first pastor of the Most Precious Blood Church, Rochester, serving from 1930 to 1937 when he was appointed pastor of St. Anthony Church, Elmira. He served there until the beginning of his illness in 1939.

He then moved back to Most Precious Blood Church where he remained until he was called back to Italy and allowed to stay with his family.

FATHER ANTHONY made his studies in Rome at Propaganda Fide and received a doctorate in Sacred Theology. He was ordained April 14, 1915. He served as a Chaplain in the first world war and assigned to a Mission band from 1918 to 1929, when he was sent to the U. S. to work among the Italian people.
