An expert was called in by the Kenya government to study the Mau Maus who in the EMBI district burned 40 schools, killed 15 teachers. The conclusion was that there was not enough religion and morality hught in the schools. American educators might apply this so lution to our juvenile "Mau Maus". . . Communists in China now have an "investiture ceremony" for 8,000,000 youths who have placed the Party Test. The symbol is a red scarf; on accepting, the youth awears: "I shall study and work well, devote myself to manual labor and will always be ready to flight for the Communist cause." Today there are less than 130 foreign missionaries in China. Of that number, three Bishops and 20 priests are in prison; most of the otherware under house ar-
