

## 200 Owego Parishioners Form Rosary Altar Society

Owego — Approximately 200 women, members of St. Patrick Parish attended the enrollment into and the forming of the Rosary Altar Society of the parish, on Sunday, Oct. 7.

The Rev. William J. O'Brien, pastor, explained the purpose and aims of the society, and emphasized the fact that the only obligation imposed on the members of the confraternity, which does not, however, bind under sin, is to recite the fifteen decades of the Rosary, devoutly meditating on them once a week.

Father O'Brien, assisted by the Rev. Bruce A. Ammering, assistant pastor, then re-dedicated the altar of the Rosary, devoutly meditating on them once a week.

A short talk on the intercession of the Blessed Virgin was given by Father Ammering, after which those attending, holding a Rosary in the right hand and a lighted blessed candle in the left, upon reaching the altar, kneeling, were formally enrolled in the Archconfraternity of the Rosary Altar Society. Father Ammering was appointed moderator of the group.

## Mary's Day Slated At Nazareth, Oct. 11

Monday, October 11, the Feast of the Maternity of Our Blessed Mother has been chosen for the Marian Year celebration at Nazareth College. At 10 o'clock the Mass of the Maternity of Mary will be offered by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. The Bishop will also preach a special sermon on this occasion of Nazareth's observance of the Marian Year.

Immediately after the Mass, Miss Barbara Moore, president of the Undergraduate Association and Sheila Conneady, vice-president, will present the students' tribute to Our Lady to the Bishop in the form of a spiritual bouquet of prayer and reparation for the conversion of Russia, as requested by Our Lady at Fatima. The Bishop will lead the student body in a special Marian Year prayer of reparation written by Pope Pius XII.

Lunch will be served to the entire student body in the college dining room followed by an assembly at 1:30 in the college auditorium. Featured in the afternoon program will be two numbers by the College Club under the direction of J. Theodore Hollenbach: the Ave Maria by T. L. Vittoria and Immaculate, the words of which were written by Bishop Kearney with music adapted from Beethoven.

HIGHLIGHT OF the afternoon program will be a symposium on the Theology of Mary, presented by senior students under the chairmanship of Barbara Scarsella, the president of the Senior Class. The first speaker, Miss Carolyn Krebs will have as her topic: The Divine Maternity; Miss Helen Bauer will speak on The Immaculate Conception and Miss Joyce Flavin will present The Assumption of Mary. This part of the program will end with a vocal solo, Schubert's Ave Maria by Miss Anita Gullio accompanied by Miss Isabel Sciacoli at the piano.

The climax of the day's celebration will be a play produced by the Speech and Dramatics Department of the College, Our Lady of Guadalupe. The play was written during the past year by a Poor Clare Nun in New Mexico and is a representation of the apparition of Our Lady in Mexico more than 400 years ago—in December, 1931.

St. Bonaventure Lists Increase St. Bonaventure, N. Y. — The enrollment at St. Bonaventure University has increased slightly more than 13 percent over last year.

The Rev. Brian Duffy, OFM, Dean, reports that 1707 students including 321 freshmen have registered for the Fall term.

This figure, he said, represents a total of 996 students on the undergraduate level and 219 graduate students. Included in these totals, he added, are 94 students of Christ the King Seminary who are candidates for either the bachelor or master degrees.

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
