#### Race Controversy

Every family decision and vote in which friends and relatives play an important role in my own family there is the story of an Elmira uncle who in the first evening of a visit to St. Louis went for an afternoon stroll. Because of civic pride, or some other reason, his hosts had neglected to remind him that the city at that time was being rocked by a series of sporadic race riots.

Later, when recounting his itinerary, he revealed to his hosts that he had walked into a "border section" through which no peaceable citizen ventured without police escort. Of course, his stroll passed without incident.

In fact, he never spoke of it but the St. Louis relatives reported it to the Elmira branch of the family, and so the story came out. I have always felt that somewhere in that anecdote lies a moral. The picture of his pleasant Celtic features, viewed through the smoke of an after-dinner cigar, was I suspect, too pleasant to inspire rioting thoughts in the mind of even the most bigoted.

ALL THIS HAS been brought to my mind by the disturbances in some places in the South over the integration of all the children of all the people into the schools that are supported by all the people.

I hope that many, many people heard of the St. Louis broadcast of October 10, in which I discussed this thorny question, all with whom I have talked were impressed by the fact

that the city at that time was being rocked by a series of sporadic race riots.

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

### Eden To Hear On Jailed Cardinal

London—(N.C.)—Britain's Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden will be requested when Parliament meets later this month to ask the Polish communist regime to release Cardinal Wysynski, the imprisoned Primate of Poland.

The request will be submitted by David Logan, veteran Catholic MP, who will point out that more than a year has elapsed since the Cardinal was imprisoned. Mr. Logan, who has sent a copy of his question to the Foreign Secretary, asks if the minister is aware "how perturbed Catholics are as to the Cardinal's whereabouts."

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
