President To Greet N.C.C.W. Convention

Boston — (NC) — President Dwight D. Eisenhower will attend the opening general session, Sunday evening, November 7, of the 27th national convention of the National Council of Catholic Women in Mechanics Hall here. The convention will be held from November 6-10.

Governor Christian A. Bowers of Massachusetts and some 100 members of the American hierarchy are also expected to attend. The convention will bring together some 3,000 delegates representing eight million Catholic women.

Speakers at the various sessions will include Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations; Dr. Richard Patten, National Catholic Welfare Conference, consultant on international affairs; and Lucile Hasky, widely known Catholic author.

THE SESSION which President Eisenhower will attend will be addressed by Archbishop Richard C. Cushing of Boston, host to the convention and Episcopal Chairman of the N.C.C.W. Department of Lay Organizations.

The convention's formal opening is set for Sunday morning, November 7, when Archbishop Albert G. Meyer of Milwaukee will preach at the Solemn Pontifical Mass.

This will be preceded on Saturday, November 6, by informal sessions for presidents of diocesan and state councils and affiliated national organizations of Catholic women. A simultaneous session will be held for diocesan presidents.

Ambassador Lodge, and Bishop John J. Wright of Worcester, will speak on Monday evening, November 8, in a general meeting devoted to international relations.

Dr. Richard Patten will speak on "A Catholic Layman in the Contemporary World." Other international figures taking part in the gathering will be four representatives of the World Union of Catholic Women's Organizations (WUCWO).

THE PRESIDENT of the WUCWO, Mlle. Marie du Resto of Paris, France, will speak on "WUCWO, Its Work for Church and Humanity." Other representatives of the organization at the convention will be Monsignor de Chanoine Lamont, spiritual moderator; Mlle. F. de Saint-Maurice, secretary general, both of France; and Senora Eldorita Sorzano de Villan of Cuba, a member of the bureau of the group.

The WUCWO is one of five international Catholic organizations that has consultative status before the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations. The National Council of Catholic Women is affiliated with the worldwide organization.

Clothing Drive For Refugees Set Nov. 21-28

Washington — (NC) — Citing the continued, acute need for clothing, bedding and blankets among refugees in Europe and the Near and Far East, especially among escapees from communism, Cincinnati's Archbishop Karl J. Alter has asked his fellow members of the American Hierarchy to participate in another Thanksgiving Clothing Collection from November 21 to 28.

As chairman of the Administrative Board of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, Archbishop Alter pointed out in his letter that the collection at Thanksgiving time each year during the last six years has "provided the channel through which our good Catholic people have been able to concretely assist the destitute and the needy."

ARCHBISHOP ALTER said that each succeeding year has seen greater generosity among American Catholics. He recalled: "Last year's collection amassed the substantial amount of 10,400,000 pounds of clothing."

Funds for ocean transportation of the relief still is made available by the Foreign Operations Administration, the Archbishop said. He added that "as in the past, War Relief Services — N.C.W.C. will be responsible for the overall conducting of the appeal."

Hodges of Richmond in the George Washington High School stadium here. It was believed to be the largest attendance at any Catholic gathering in Virginia's history.

Church Red Target In Trieste Zone

Trieste — (NC) — Calumny, deportation and induction into the army will be used by the Tito regime to wipe out Catholic influence in Zone B as it becomes an integral part of the Yugoslav state, according to information reaching here.

The information is contained in a confidential instruction sent to Yugoslav secret police in the zone. A copy of the document fell into the hands of a Slovene school teacher and was forwarded here.

"The clerical types among Catholic elements who in the past nine years have been seen frequenting the churches and going to confession and taking communion," the document says, "are a menace to the safety and interests of the League of the Yugoslav Communists (Communist party)."

"BECAUSE THEY live in an exposed, dangerous frontier zone and because they take their inspiration from the Vatican, the League of the Yugoslav Communists is compelled to adopt extraordinary measures for the security of the country and the preservation and development of socialism."

The memorandum then instructs that "as soon as circumstances permit the pious fanatic, clerical elements should be sent to places in the interior. All young men whose parents are known 'for their friendship with priests,' it states, 'should immediately be inducted into the army.'"

Heart Patient Now Hopes To Be Nun

Philadelphia, Pa. — (NC) — A frail, 36-year-old heart patient who never has known life outside of a hospital or an orphanage now may be able to fulfill an "impossible" lifelong ambition to become a nun.

The years of suffering, which began in infancy when Julia McCann, now 16, was pronounced a victim of tetanitic fever, left her physically weak and thin in proportion to other girls her age. But her faith is stronger than most and her smile has provided courage to many a bedside patient.

As her condition became steady, she said, "I believe I will get strong."

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Cardinal Writes UN Day Prayer

New York — (RNS) — His Eminence, Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, has written a prayer for United Nations Day, Oct. 24, in honor of the anniversary of the founding of the international body.

Text of the prayer follows:

"No nation without God can know peace, and only they can give God's peace who know His peace. Therefore do we pray for all nations, a peace not imposed by force or fear, not bought by gold or guile, not gained by blood baths of hate, but a peace, the gift of God's giving to men of good will for godly living."

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Irish Bishops Aid German Refugees

Dublin — (RNS) — The Catholic Bishops of Ireland appealed for contributions to set up a West German mission house to minister to refugees from Communist-dominated areas.

In a statement issued following a meeting at St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, the hierarchy asked about half of 11,000,000 refugees in West Germany are Catholics.

Although their material condition is wretched, the Bishops declared, "even more pitiable is the plight from a spiritual standpoint of those who are Catholics."

"Considerably more than half their priests died from hardships they had to endure during the period of migration, and of those that remain many are old or in delicate health and all are without material resources."
