Msgr. Connaughton died Oct. 13, 1954, at Mother's Hospital, Gregory, S. D.

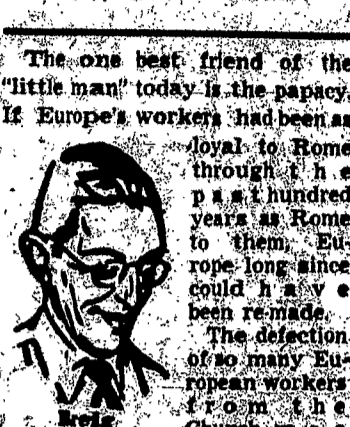

School Integration Catholic Leadership Lauded By Negro Newspaper

Pittsburgh, Pa.—(NC)—Leadership taken by Catholic schools in southern States in the integration of Negro pupils following the U.S. Supreme Court decision banning segregation in the nation's public schools was termed "most heartening" and sets the pace for that section" by a leading Negro newspaper published here.

The Courier, largest Negro weekly in the nation, made its observations in an editorial dealing with a Catholic Press survey on the progress of Catholic elementary and high schools, universities and colleges across the nation, regarding the integration problem. The survey was compiled by the N.C.W.C. News Service.

"WHILE CATHOLIC officials in some areas in the deep South have had to withhold action for the time being in deference to long-standing social custom," the editorial said, "it is illuminating to learn that Negro and white children are sitting side by side in Catholic schools in many parts of Arizona, Arkansas, Delaware, the District of Columbia, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Missouri, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and West Virginia."

The Courier noted that some of these changes were effected before the Supreme Court had handed down its decision last May 17. It added: "The Catholic Hierarchy has handed down the word and the directions are being carried out as quickly as practicable, and much more progress has been made than even some of the greatest optimists dreamed."

'Thought For Day' Telephone Idea Makes Big Hit With Texans

Corpus Christi, Tex.—(NC)—Down here in Corpus Christi, you pick up a telephone and dial 3-2911. The voice at the other end says: "One moment please. This is Father Norman. Here is my thought for better living today."

Then for just 30 seconds the listener is given a good solid thought to encourage and inspire him, via a recording. The recordings are changed daily. Here are some sample thoughts:

"Life is like a keyboard of a piano—first a white key, then a black one—first a major chord of joy, then a minor chord of sorrow, but somehow both form the perfect melody of life."

"The mind is like a parachute—it doesn't work unless it's open."

"Time is the rhythm of eternity. Life measures actions its notes, and only that which leads up to it really counts."

THE SERVICE, called "One Moment, Please," was originated by Father Norman Stuber, assistant pastor of Corpus Christi Cathedral, with the assistance of Stanton Bell of the telephone company, and T. Frank Smith, owner of radio station KRIS, who worked out the technical details.

Father Stuber's dial-a-thought project is similar to one introduced several months ago by Dale Francis of the Catholic Information Center in Charlotte, N. C., which also proved highly successful.

It has been in operation for a month and between 3,000 and 4,000 calls are received daily now, Father Stuber explained. The idea behind it is that thoughts control men's minds. So, it is important for us to get the right kind of thoughts. This service is to help provide inspiration at work or play. If it will help us to love Christ a little bit more, it will help our community to be a much better place."

THE HOLY FATHER

is trying to remind us of these obvious things; these taken-for-granted things. The point is that they shouldn't be taken for granted. They should be fiercely guarded.

The Holy See can smell danger a hundred years off. There is no peril that the papacy has not experienced as a reality. The papacy has lived through times of savagery and barbarism; through the collapse of civilizations. It has long been menaced by the hordes of Attila the Hun. It has seen the wild men, the uneducated men, running through Europe, plundering, burning, murdering. The Holy See knows that where family life collapses, men can become crueler than the beast of the field.

I can remember perfectly well a time when some people's eyes bugged out as if they were hearing blasphemy at the mere mention of labor unions or social security. The same kind of folk are on the verge of apoplexy today when you suggest doing anything for family life, like providing Family Allowances to assist the fathers of many children. Yet Canada does it; Australia does it; many nations do it. It is one of those obvious things which the Holy See is always pointing out to us, and which we seem to have preposterous difficulty in seeing.

THE OFFER DAY

THE OFFER DAY, the Holy Father warned that if the word is to survive its present crisis, it must begin by rebuilding families.

Pope Pius called for steps to insure that men can marry young, and earn enough to provide for their families and lay away something for a rainy day. But that is done, he said, society will become ever more disorganized and more exposed to the germs of social and moral corruption.

CERTAINLY IT seems odd that a truth so obvious should need to be pointed out by the Holy See. But for many a long decade, the Vatican has been striving might and main to make mankind see the obvious. I refer you, for example, to such now obvious things as social security, workmen's compensation, pensions, labor associations, and the like.

Surely nothing is easier to perceive than that any society is on the way to self-destruction when its young people are economically unable to settle down to family life.
