The Mass on Saturday will be celebrated by the Very Rev. John Prosper, C.S.S.R., former rector who will also preside. The sisters will be given a dinner in the school hall.

His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey will be the principal speaker at a banquet in Hotel Seneca at 6:30 p.m. for alumni and friends.

Very Rev. Gerald J. Whelan, C.S.S.R., rector of St. Joseph Church directed the week's festivities marking the anniversary. He was aided by a loyal and hard-working group of graduates of St. Joseph's Commercial School, he said.

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Baroness von Guttenberg To Open Lecture Series

Baroness Elisabeth von Guttenberg will open the Thomas More Lecture Forum, 1954-1955 Season on Tuesday, Oct. 26 at 8:15 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce according to the Very Rev. Msgr. John S. Randall, executive director. The Baroness will speak on "GERMANY—AN IMPORTANT KEY TO THE FUTURE."

West German democratic leader, social worker and author, Baroness Elizabeth von Guttenberg is the first such personage to come to America since World War II. Her eloquent and thrilling addresses are a deeply revealing narrative of the struggle of European leaders of principle and ideals to rebuild a new society without losing the best values of the old.

Her life is a story of self sacrifice and heroism, of Germany emerging from chaos into order and dignity. The Baroness grew up in Bavaria in an almost legendary world of stately castles and world-famed personalities. She became the wife of Baron George-Enoch von Guttenberg, political leader and commander of the army which liberated Munich from the Spartacists after World War I.

During the rise of Hitler she and her husband were active in the anti-Nazi underground which pledged itself to end the dictatorship. The Baron was seized and imprisoned. After obtaining her husband's release from prison, she was again separated from him by the outbreak of the War and his enforced service in the German navy, as the commanding officer of the converted Egoropa.

The Baron never gave up his fight against Hitler. He died as the result of injuries received when the Allies bombed Bremen. Elizabeth and her family continued to work with the underground and her family became involved in the abortive plot to assassinate Hitler.

After the fall of Hitler she established a center in Bavaria for the education and training of women—so successful that other centers patterned after it have been established by the government.

Her autobiography, "Holding the Stirrup," is one of the many writings which flow from her restless and creative mind. Her vivid descriptions of conditions abroad, and her faith in the future of her people and the civilization we share, is a new analysis of our times and something encouraging and bracing for Americans to hear.
