**Nazareth Academy Seniors**  
**Slate Wilder's 'Our Town'**

Nazareth Academy will present "Our Town" as their senior play on Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 3 and 4 at 8 p.m. in the school auditorium, Lake Ave.

Thorn-ton Wilder, Pulitzer Prize-winning play is unique in that it is performed almost entirely without scenery.

A Stage Manager sets the scenes for the spectator and indicates in each scene the function in the set of the few props used, mostly chairs, rearranged throughout the evening to represent everything from a kitchen to a cemetery.

FLAYGOERS will be their own scenic designers with the opportunity to give free play to their imagination.

Wilder's Broadway play is the story of typical figures in a country village. Grover's Corners, a small town in New Hampshire, is both the hero and the plot.

All the familiar sights and sounds of a village are evoked: the clanking of the milk wagon on its early morning rounds, the slip of the newspaper being thrown against front doors, the crow of the rooster, the air of a sleeping town gathering itself into life, and the silence of town streets after dusk.

THE CHARM of the play is attributed to the fact that it is a picture of the "American Way of Life" told by an author who sees beyond the ordinary everyday happenings a depth of meaning and consequence.

Leading characters are played by: David Bertich as Stage Manager, John Bonifacio Maser as George Gibbs, Elizabeth Marsh as Emily Webb, Rosemary Culbert as Mrs. Webb, Anne Devlin as Mrs. Gibbs and Patricia Coleman as Rebecca Gibbs.
