


Mass Celebrated In Nine Rites

Archbishop James L. Neary (left) is consecrating to the Catholic Church a church dedicated in Convention Hall here as the highlight of the three-day National Eucharistic Marian Congress. This marked the first time in the history of the United States that the Mass was celebrated simultaneously in so many rites or varieties. The total number of participants in five variations—the Armenian, the Chaldean, the Maronite and the Latin—was 11,000 persons. From 240 Ukrainian and other Eastern rite parishes about 1,000 priests were present.

30,000 Attend Oriental CongressBy JACK DALY, JR.

Philadelphia. An estimated 30,000 people took part in the three-day National Eucharistic Marian Congress in the Oriental Eastern Rites. It was believed to be first international Congress of its kind.

Prayer, by interchanging for the blessings of the free world their prayers for others, not so fortunate, especially those beyond the Iron Curtain, were the intentions of the gathering sponsored by the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Byzantine Slavic Rites.

In addition to thousands of Catholics, the Congress was attended by many members of the hierarchy of both the Eastern and Western Rites from the world. Three Cardinals, eight Archbishops, 18 Bishops,

Divine Liturgy (Mass) at nine altars arranged in the civic auditorium of Convention Hall here. About 12,000 attended the ceremony.

His Excellency Amleto Giavani Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, presided at the consecration and gave a sermon in English.

"Where could one find a stronger bond and more significant expression of unity of the blessings of the free world than in this," said Archbishop Cicognani, "where Bishops and priests of different rites renew the Eucharistic Mystery?"

The CARDINALS are Their Eminences Peter G.V. Cardinal Emanuele Peter XV Cardinal of the Armenians from Beirut, Lebanon; Samuel Cardinal Stritch, Archbishop of Chicago, and Thomas Cardinal Tisi of S.Y.D., exiled Archbishop of Peking, China.

Sermons at the ceremonies were given in both Ukrainian and English.

**Labor Delegates
Unconvinced By Reds'
'Religious Freedom'**

London. — (NC) — Two leading members of the British Labor Party mission to China have labeled as unconvincing the "evidence" of religious freedom proffered by the men of Peking.

But the Labor delegates believed the Christian representatives they met were honest men trying to do what they could in the circumstances.

One delegate, Sam Watson, head of Britain's shipworkers union, declared:

"I want to be fair to the Christians. I think they have the right to exist. I think they have the right to create a national church within the framework of the new state they will have to preserve Christian principles."

Mr. Watson and Arthur Phillips, Labor Party secretary general, gave a press conference to the International Catholic newspaper.

Both said that in fulfillment of a pledge made to Catholics before they left Britain, they did try to probe into the persecution of the Catholic Church but that they failed. Mr. Watson declared he asked questions and received answers that were "most unsatisfactory."

"I suppose it would have been a crime against the state to teach the children to love Americans," Mr. Watson said.

Both Mr. Phillips and Mr. Watson seemed inclined to believe that the communist regime's attitude to religion was dictated partly by an upsurge of intense nationalism following the break with the west and the imposition of socialism. They said the Chinese government seemed out to destroy the missions because they were established by foreign sources.

None of the Labor delegation made any headway when he tried to get to grips with the persecution issue. One Chinese official said there is no persecution. An

other said that action against Catholics was only taken for political offenses or for crimes against the State. Mr. Watson pressed for a definition of such "crimes" and several instances were quoted without evidence.

The Labor men were told of a Catholic priest, a layman and a Japanese agent found translating official documents. They were told other stories but "the more we pressed for evidence the more they relied on documents we never saw," said Mr. Watson.

HE TOLD THE UNIVERSE of one piece of evidence he did see: children being taught from pictures books showing American soldiers ill-treating North Koreans. It was explained that the pictures had been chosen to impress on the children the evils of imperialism.

"I suppose it would have been a crime against the state to teach the children to love Americans," Mr. Watson said.

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**Quads Born To Canadians,

The boy has been named Francois and two of his sisters, Jeanne and Lucia, are the names of the three children to whom Our Lady appeared at Fatima, Portugal, in 1917. The third girl has been named Maria, in honor of being born in the Marian Year.

The multiple birth took place at Hotel Dieu Hospital here. The attending physician was Dr. C. H. Johnston. Four other doctors assisted and the babies were placed in incubators for a time.

First born was Francois, who weighed four pounds, five ounces. The three girls each weighed four pounds, three ounces.

Mrs. Doucet, the former Violia Veltman of West Bathurst, was overjoyed. "I expected a big baby, but not four," she said with a happy smile. They have one other child, Theresa, 14 months.

HER HUSBAND, 42 and a World War II veteran, is a \$50-a-week truck driver and has worked 17 years for his present employer. For two weeks prior to the quad birth he had been on vacation. He was to have returned to work the day after the

multiple birth but a neighbor has offered a six room home at a small rental.

Mr. and Mrs. Doucet had been planning to build a bungalow for themselves. He already had bought the bricks. Now the plans for the house will have to be enlarged.

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**Top Reds Admit Falseness
Of Coexistence Between

London. — Can communism and Christianity co-exist? In Soviet satellite countries, Red propagandists have often deemed it expedient to argue that Marxism and Christianity can exist peacefully side-by-side.

But this is an absolutely false argument according to some man is attracted toward what is new, but the relic of the past bind him and prevent him from marching forward.

Their grim implacable opposition to any form of religion is reflected in a handbook for anti-religious propagandists which is no export and which utterly contradicts some of the "tolerant" statements on religion by the Moscow Radio broadcast of late for foreign consumption.

This handbook is called "No Bloknot Agitator" ("Agitator Notebook No. 24"). It was designed to help atheist propagandists who are now conducting an all-out campaign against religious superstition in the Soviet territories especially among the young people.

Here is what Bloknot Agitator says:

An increasing number of people are convinced that religion does not interfere with the building of communism; that it stands apart from communal life; that it is occupied with its own heavy affairs and does no harm to believers.

THERE ARE people who seriously believe that religion and communism do not contradict one another. There are even some comrades who mistakenly believe that freedom of conscience means freedom to follow a religious cult.

"Such people fail to understand the attitude of the Communist Party, which regards religion as the ideology of the bourgeoisie, which must be expunged."

Bloknot Agitator is full of advice on how to approach the believer. He is not to be scolded, mocked or derided; he must be talked to patiently and understandingly.
