Father Contegiacomo said that the shrine will be a fitting tribute to the Blessed Virgin, St. Anne and to the Marian Year.

The erection of the shrine was initiated when an invalid girl asked the president of the Society of St. Anne to erect such a monument as a tribute to the Marian Year.

SVD Missionaries To Build Junior College At Hemlock

Ground was broken for a new wing at the St. Michael's Mission Seminary at Hemlock Lake on Monday. The new wing will double the space of the existing Seminary building.

This action followed decision received from headquarters of the Divine Word Missionaries in Rome to add the Junior College department to the growing Seminary at Hemlock Lake.

FIVE YEARS ago the Eastern Novitiate was added to the Seminary which had previously been a minor seminary as well as the Brothers' Juniorate and Novitiate. At that time the present Chapel and Novitiate wing were erected to house the new department.

The opening of the Junior College Department, scheduled for September 1955 on completion of the new wing, is a further step in the expansion of the Eastern Province of the Society of the Divine Word. The Eastern Province embraces the Eastern States and Canada. However, the Juniors who are now attending the St. Paul's Mission Seminary at Epworth, Iowa will also attend St. Michael's Seminary at Hemlock Lake making it the Juniorate of all three American Provinces of the SVD.

OFFICIATING at the ground breaking for the new wing were all three American Provincial Superiors: the Very Rev. Robert C. Hunten, S.V.D., Eastern Provincial with headquarters at Girard, Pa.; Very Rev. William Bauer, S.V.D., Southern Provincial with headquarters at Bay St. Louis, Mississippi; and Very Rev. Lawrence Mack, S.V.D., Western Provincial with headquarters at Techon, Ill.

Masters of Ceremonies were the Very Rev. Casimir Murawski, S.V.D., Rector of St. Michael's Mission Seminary and the Rev. M. Paul, S.V.D., Professor of Latin, Greek and Liturgy.

Engaged for the building are Mr. George Lorenz, architect and Mr. Joseph Kircher, general contractor, both of Rochester, N.Y. Also assisting at the ceremonies were the faculty of the seminary and all the Clerical and Brother Novices as well as the Brothers Candidates and friends of the Seminary.
