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Protestant Minister's Views Concern India Catholics

New Delhi, India—(NC)—Developments concerning the Protestant Church in India have brought concern to Catholics for their likely effect on the foreign missionaries' question.

A statement made in Madras by the Rev. H. Sumitra, Moderator of the Church of South India dealt with the pet Protestant idea of national churches.

He talked about the "independence of the Church in India," he exhorted "Indian Christians" to prepare themselves for that independence. He even conceded that the opposition of the Indian government to foreign missionaries was a little justified "under the circumstances."

The Rev. Sumitra said that the evangelistic task of the Church became independent. "Independence may be forced upon us if we are not prepared for it," he asserted.

WHAT WORRIES Catholics about the Rev. Sumitra's statement is that the vast majority of Hindus will not take it for what it really is—a strictly Protestant viewpoint, expressed by a Protestant clergyman to a Protestant audience. Such distinctions are not easily digestible in a non-Christian country like India.

Irish Bishops Ask Aid For Refugees

Dublin, Ireland—(NC)—An appeal for material and spiritual aid to Catholic refugees in Western Germany was issued by the Irish hierarchy at a meeting of the Bishops in St. Patrick's College, Maynooth, County Kildare.

The Bishops called specifically for the establishment of a Mission House in western Germany to help meet the needs of the approximately 3,000,000 refugees, mostly Germans, expelled from eastern territories under the Potsdam Agreement of 1945.

Top Churchgoers Glasgow, Scotland—(NC)—Only half the adult Catholics in Glasgow go to Mass on Sundays, a survey undertaken by the local university revealed. But Catholics total 62 per cent of all churchgoers.

Cassino, Italy—(NC)—Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida of Japan was received with full protocol on a visit to the papal summer palace here for an audience with His Holiness Pope Pius XII.

During a cordial conversation in the Holy Father's private study, Pope Pius voiced his pleasure over an assurance given by Premier Yoshida that the Catholics of Japan are completely loyal citizens and make their just contribution to the welfare of the country.

The Prime Minister is not himself a Catholic, but most of his family are.

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
