Life On Planets Described By Noted Jesuit Astronomer

"If man finally succeeds in flying to the moon, he will run the risk of freezing in the shade and of broiling in the sun," said the Rev. Francis J. Heyden, S.J., director of the Georgetown University Astronomical Observatory in address-

ing members of the Georgetown Club of Rochester at their fall meeting.

THE MAIN SUBJECT of Father Heyden's talk was the expedition which he directed for the study of the total solar eclipse of June 30, 1954. A graduate of the astronomy of Harvard University, Father Heyden, since assuming the directorship of the Georgetown University in 1937, has become a prominent figure in international astronomical circles.

A recent article on the Society of Jesus in Life magazine, featured him as one of the outstanding American Jesuits. Well aware of his experience in this field, the U. S. Government last year asked him to supervise the preparation of the 1954 eclipse expedition.

This involved the outfitting with technical equipment of 36 observation stations at sites ranging from Hudson Bay to Iran. Father Heyden himself took charge of the Iran outpost. To man the other observation points he secured the cooperation of astronomers of several other universities.

FATHER HEYDEN illustrated his lecture with color film taken at his observatory in Iran.

St. John Fisher College Receives Gifts For Study

Dr. Ross H. Arnett, Jr., Head of the Biology Department of St. John Fisher College has announced the gift to the college of four cleaned skulls of raccoons (Procyon lotor) from the Smithsonian Institute, United States National Museum, Washington, D. C.

Dr. Arnett, who previous to his appointment to St. John Fisher College was associated with the Smithsonian Institute, explained that such uncatalogued duplicate specimens can be given to educational institutions by the National Museum. Such gifts are a part of their program for the diffusion of knowledge.

THE SPECIMENS were collected in the winter of 1953-54, near Laurel, Md., by Ernest B. Marshall, who every year turns over to the National Museum skulls of animals that he traps for fur. Dr. Arnett has also announced a gift from Ward National Science Estate, Inc. of Rochester.

This gift includes several fine walnut and curly maple cabinets with glass drawers and pinning bottoms. These were to be used for local fauna and flora for reference and student identification of personal collections.

In addition, the gift includes a set of Seitz-Macrolepidoptera, printed in Germany and illustrated in color.
