Enrollment Listed At Niagara U.

Niagara University, N. Y.—A total of 1245 students have enrolled at Niagara University for the fall semester, according to figures released by the Rev. Joseph L. Boegel, C.M., registrar. A total of 392 students have enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences; 464 in the College of Business Administration; 101 in the Graduate School; 67 in the School of Education; 96 in the College of Nursing and 123 in the Seminary of Our Lady of Angels. Veteran enrollment, which has shown a steady decline since 1946, when 1071 veterans were registered at the university, has increased approximately seven per cent over last year. According to Father Boegel, 151 veterans are pursuing studies at Niagara at the present time. He also added that 190 young women are enrolled in the various colleges and schools at the university for the current semester.
