Marquette Group To Mark Jubilee

Golden Jubilee celebration of the Marquette League, the Catholic Indian mission-aid organization, (289 Fourth Ave., New York 10, N.Y.), will bring a Cardinal, an Archbishop, nine Bishops, 19 Monsignors, a number of priests and Brothers of the Catholic American Indian missionary world to New York on Nov. 14.

His Eminence Cardinal Spellman, Episcopal Advisory Committee chairman of the Marquette League will preside at Solemn Pontifical Mass at 10 a.m. in St. Patrick's Cathedral. One of his attendants will be the Very Rev. Mgr. John S. Randall, diocesan director, Society for the Propagation of the Faith, Diocese of Rochester.

Celebrant will be Archbishop Edwin V. Byrne of Santa Fe and preacher will be Auxiliary Bishop Thomas J. McDonnell of Wheeling.

During its 50 years of existence, the Marquette League has contributed more than \$2,500,000 to Indian missionary work, built some 200 chapels, and other mission buildings, and has aided in the support of missionaries in the field, averaging about 700 priests, Sisters and Brothers.

Director General of the League prior to the Rev. Bernard A. Cullen who will be host to the dignitaries was Thomas R. Ray, Mgr. William J. Flynn, a native of Rochester.

Honeoye Falls—Seeking \$15,000 as a goal to help defray the expense of purchase and redecoration of the new rectory for St. Paul of the Cross Church in Honeoye Falls, the pastor, Rev. Howard W. Geck, his committee and workers met on Monday evening of this week to tally reports for the first week of the campaign.

Team captains Edwin Harsh, Frank Grace and James McGuire, after registering all pledges, calls made and prospects still to be contacted, were enthusiastic about the success of the campaign. The total subscriptions as of Nov. 8, the midway of the drive, amounted to \$10,924.00 from approximately two-thirds of the wage earners in the parish.

THE NEW RECTORY, already occupied by Father Geck, is located on Monroe Street in Honeoye Falls, the former home of George Vallone, Honeoye Falls business man for many years. Considerable alteration was made on the home with provision for living quarters for an assistant priest; a visiting clergyman; an attractive community room; an adequate office and conference room, and private living quarters for a housekeeper.

Area Directors Announced For Annual Clothing Drive

Appointment of seven priests as area directors of the Catholic Bishops' Thanksgiving Clothing Collection, to be held in the parishes of the Rochester Diocese during the week of Nov. 21, was announced by the Rev. E. Leo McMannus, diocesan director of the drive.

The newly-appointed directors are: The Rev. Kierara J. Hickey, O.Carm., Auburn; the Rev. Albert V. Ryan, Elmira; the Rev. James P. Slattery, Corning; the Rev. J. Walter Carron, Geneva; the Rev. Robert MacNamara, Hornell; the Rev. Otto Vogt, Ithaca; and the Rev. Daniel V. Hogan, Rochester.

As area directors they will supervise the promotion of the drive in their localities.

BECAUSE OF the generous donations of clothing by American Catholics to their parish clothing collections last year, the War Relief Services of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, which is responsible for the nationwide clothing collection, allocated shipments of clothing for the needy of 21 countries, including Italy, Trieste, Greece, Lebanon, Jordan, Syria, Pakistan, India, Vietnam, Hong Kong, Formosa, and Korea.

Shipments were also made for the relief of displaced persons in Germany, Austria, and France.

"This year again the need is just as severe, if not more so," said Father McMannus, "and parish collection centers will be open to receive all wearable articles of clothing. Most needed are wool sweaters, skirts, underwear of all types, men's work pants, overcoats for men and women, blankets, mittens and all types of children's and infant wear. Obviously unsuitable for relief distribution are pocketbooks, women's straw hats, and high-heeled shoes."

The pastors will expound the location of their own collection centers, to which donations may be taken during the week of Nov. 21. At the close of the drive the collected clothing will be shipped by the parish organizations to the N.C.W.C. warehouses in the Bronx. Subsequent ocean transportation is made available by the Foreign Operations Administration, and the final distribution of the clothing to the needy abroad is directed by the War Relief Services of the N.C.W.C.
