Tens of thousands of people daily pass our National Office at 1 266 Fifth Avenue, New York. To educate them concerning our work, which last year aided sixty-five million people throughout the world, we have opened a Mission Exhibit. This exhibit asks you to do us the favor of a visit. We will tell you two of the very interesting items.

First, there is a Crucifixion scene, nine feet high, in which Our Lord is represented as being crucified on a Sickle. Manacles are about His wrists, and He is chained to the Russian symbol of persecution. Underneath the Sickle and on the left, is a life-sized figure of a Russian soldier with the Hammer, the other symbol of Communist tyranny, about to drive the last Nail into the Feet of Our Lord.
