

Guidance Workshop Set At Nazareth Academy

A Guidance Workshop under the direction of Miss Marie A. Corrigan, guidance coordinator for Catholic Schools in St. Paul, Minn., will open today (Friday, Nov. 19) at Nazareth Academy on Lake Avenue.

Today's session will include demonstrations of group guidance on the high school level, grades 9-12. Groups will number about 35 students from grade in each session. Student leaders will meet at another time for a conference on "Leadership Responsibility of the Catholic High School Student."

THE TECHNIQUE used in group and individual guidance will be discussed on Saturday. Also included in Saturday's program will be further discussion of group guidance on grade levels from 8-10 and 11-12.

The Workshop is a project of the Sisters of St. Joseph for the purpose of developing Guidance programs on a community basis so that a faculty member transferred from one school to another will be familiar with the administration of the guidance service in the new school.

Miss Corrigan is currently engaged in co-ordinating guidance programs for 11 high schools staffed by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Carondelet in the St. Paul Province. She formerly served as consultant for various diocesan school systems in their guidance work, among them the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

A GRADUATE of the College of St. Catherine in St. Paul, Miss Corrigan did further work at the Catholic University on a Graduate level and at the University of Minnesota from which she received her Masters Degree and where she is now a candidate for a Doctor's Degree. She worked on the staff of the Counseling Bureau of the University of Minnesota and later was Dean of Women and lecturer in the Department of Education at Catholic University.

Members of the high school faculties of St. Agnes and De Sales, Geneva, principals and eighth grade teachers of parochial schools taught by the Sisters of St. Joseph are invited to attend the Workshop.

A member of Holy Rosary parish, he is studying for the priesthood in the Diocese of Alexandria, La. where he made preliminary study.


For many years, Mr. Taylor served Mass at St. Ann's Home.

\$100,000 Building Fund To Be Launched At Glen

Watkins Glen—St. Mary of the Lake Parish here will launch a Building Fund Appeal for a \$100,000 Catechetical and Social Center Saturday, Nov. 27, according to the Rev. Benedict Ehmman, pastor.

HIS EXCELLENCY, Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence E. Casey will address the campaign workers at the opening dinner meeting.

The contemporary styled two-story building will be located next to the parish rectory on Decatur St. and provide classrooms and meeting rooms on the first floor and a hall seating 400 on the second floor.

Religious instruction classes have been conducted in a garage and this arrangement, according to Father Ehmman, can no longer be considered satisfactory.

More than 350 children are regularly instructed each week at Watkins Glen, which does not have its own parochial school. The new center will also provide facilities for parish societies and for recreational activities, the pastor said.

CONTRIBUTIONS made from people of the Odesa district will be set aside for construction of a chapel to be built there in the spring of 1955.

The campaign committee is made up of eight divisions with Emmett Gilson and John Viglione, co-chairmen; Harry Swits and Daniel Haley, assistant chairmen.
