Boys Town Eager For Win Over Aquinas

Boys Town will return to Rochester on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 25 to renew the football rivalry started with Aquinas in 1947. Thus far in the Boys Town-Aquinas rivalry, Aquinas has always emerged the victor, but by very close scores. Last year Aquinas scored a 13-12 victory.

Coach Skip Fairang has repeatedly said, "I'll keep coming to Rochester until I can beat Aquinas." Twice Aquinas has spoiled a perfect season record for the Boys Town team.

The game scheduled at the Aquinas Memorial Stadium at 11 a.m. should attract many thousands of football fans from the area. Boys Town is coming to Rochester with a 7-2 record this season against some of the leading competition in the nation.

The Aquinas team coached by Stan Zajdel will be looking for a victory to maintain its record of never having had a losing season.

Boys Town football teams have an enviable record for attendance at their games. Attendance has topped 40,000 numerous times with the record attendance of 43,839 against Catholic Central in Detroit Briggs Stadium.

Specifications on the team list Frank Curry as the biggest boy of the squad. The veteran center tips the scales at 255 pounds. The tallest boys are tackles Ed Rander and Glen McKinnon, both of whom are six feet, four inches tall, while close behind are two ends, Jim Cook and Glen Hepburn, both six feet, two inches tall.
