Hornell—Men of St. Ann parish, who died within the past year, were remembered at the annual memorial service of the Holy Name Society, conducted by the Rev. Leo Mans, moderator.

The deceased men's names were read and candles lighted in their memory. The candlelight ceremony, Father Mans explained, symbolizes the life of the soul, which is a grain of wheat, which, in sacrament of baptism, symbolically is carried through

life, beyond the grave, to the throne of God. The Rev. Joseph P. Harrey, pastor of St. Mary Church in Rexville, gave the memorial sermon. He based his talk on the Scriptural passage: "It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins."

Father Harrey encouraged the members to assist the Holy Souls in Purgatory by their prayers, good works and especially by attendance at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

Death came unexpectedly to the Woodville resident following a short illness. A funeral service was held in St. Catherine Cemetery with Father Turner officiating.

Navy for three years during World War II, two years of which he was stationed in the Pacific Theatre. While in service he sustained a serious back injury while aboard ship.

Despite his long years of ill health, he continued his work. He was a member of St. Catherine Church, Williams-Greenham Post American Legion, and Cornish Lodge of Elks. He was greatly interested in sports and wild life and had been an active member of Addison Club and Game Club for many years.

Besides his parents, he is survived by one brother, James Tobin of Rochester; three sisters, Major Nora Tobin, U. S. Army Nurse Corps, Ft. Leonard Wood, Miss Mrs. Dan Daly of Utica and Miss Betty Tobin, Acton.


