

Address To ILO

Pope, Urges Higher Goals For World Labor Movement

Vatican City—(NC)—Pope Pius XII has called on the labor movement to aim higher than at mere material gains and to set its sights on the sublime values of civilization, the union of minds and hearts.

The Holy Father developed these thoughts in an address to members of the administrative council of the International Labor Organization (ILO) whom he received in audience at Castel Gandolfo, the papal summer residence.

"The labor movement cannot consider its foundations in terms of opposition to other social classes or to exaggerated state domination."

"THE END to which the labor movement tends must be considered on the same plane on which your organization (the ILO) has placed it, namely on a world plane—as the Encyclical Quadragesimo Anno envisioned it—in a social order where material benefit results from a sincere collaboration of all toward the general welfare and where it serves as support for the most sublime values, those of civilization and above all the indestructible union of minds and hearts."

"It is because of these efforts the Pope said that Christian labor movements have been giving full support to the international labor organization, one of the specialized agencies of the United Nations. They should reach their social objectives more quickly by the establishment of living conditions that safeguard the inalienable rights of the human person as contained in natural and promulgated in positive law."

10 Children Accepted In Nuns' Home After Mother's Death

Philadelphia—The Sacred Heart Home and Trade School conducted by the Missionary Sisters of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus at Coopersburg, near here, has been "enlarged" almost overnight.

Not physically, however, but by the addition of 10 motherless children to the 30 youngsters already cared for by the nuns under the supervision of Mother M. Alfreda.

The newcomers are children of Frank Hudac, a 44-year-old cement mill worker whose wife died last May leaving him with the staggering problem of feeding, clothing and educating them. Plus that he was faced with the almost unsolvable problem of providing them with real home life.

Mr. Hudac's plight and the heart-warming response of residents of this general area in Lehigh County came to light when it was learned that the nuns of the Sacred Heart Home and Trade School would welcome the children.

DESCRIBED AS resembling a set of stairs, the youngsters range in age from six months to 18 years. Actually there are 12 children, but Michael, the baby, is being cared for by an aunt in Brooklyn, N. Y., and George, the oldest, will remain at home with his father.

Vatican Pact Again Upheld By Adenauer

Bonn, Germany—(RNS)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has assured the Catholic Church that the West German government upholds the validity of the concordat concluded between Germany and the Vatican in 1933.

The Chancellor gave the assurance to Archbishop Wilhelm Berning of Osnabrueck, Bishop Joseph Godehard Machens of Hildesheim, Bishop Michael Keller of Muenster, and Auxiliary Bishop Franz Hengsbach of Paderborn.

The prelates, whose dioceses are in the West German state of Lower Saxony, called upon Dr. Adenauer to make known their concern over a law, recently passed by the state legislature, to abolish state-subsidized confessional (denominational) schools.

The Social Democratic government of Lower Saxony, provides for the conversion into so-called "community" (interdenominational) schools of more than 2,000 Catholic and Protestant schools.

Chancellor Adenauer told the prelates that the federal government agreed with the Catholic Church that the Lower Saxony measure conflicts with the school provisions of the concordat, and that negotiations with the Lower Saxony government on the matter are already under way.

Card Leger Named Legate To Lourdes

Montreal—(NC)—News of the appointment by Pope Pius XII of His Eminence Paul Emile Cardinal Leger, Archbishop of Montreal, as the Holy Father's Legate at solemn ceremonies closing the Marian Year at Lourdes on December 8, has been received here with much satisfaction.

The 50-year-old Cardinal is especially known as "the Cardinal of the Rosary" because of his great devotion to the "Blessed Mother" and his daily recitation for four years of the Rosary over a Montreal radio station, a religious program which has drawn a following of hundreds of thousands of persons.

7th Priest Jailed By Peron Regime

Buenos Aires—(RNS)—A seventh Catholic priest was arrested here in President Juan D. Peron's campaign against elements within the Church which says are "hostile" to his regime.

Federal police seized the Rev. Rodolfo Carboni, pastor of Santa Rosa de Lima church and spiritual adviser to the Association of Catholic Workers, shortly after he had preached a sermon referring to the tense Church-State situation.

He was arrested in his parish house following a morning Mass at which his sermon was interrupted by three women who then left the church.

IN THE SERMON, Father Carboni talked about President Peron's charge that three members of the hierarchy and some 24 priests were trying to undermine his government and infiltrate the pro-Peron labor unions.

Of six priests arrested earlier, two were given summary police sentences of five days in jail. The other four were held for questioning a day or two and then released.

Catholic observers generally regard the president's strong attack on certain clergymen as an outgrowth of his determination to keep the Argentine labor movement completely under his control.

THE THREE members of the hierarchy cited by Gen. Peron have long been active in spreading the teachings of the papal social encyclicals.

They are Archbishops Nicolas Fasolino of Santa Fe and Firmin Letitte of Cordoba and Bishop Froilan Ferreira Reinafe of La Rioja.

The president's Nov. 10 speech was the sharpest criticism made up to that time of the Church's influence in the labor movement. But it had been preceded for several weeks by complaints in the Peronist press that priests were "infiltrating" the unions.

This charge was repeated by President Peron when he described the three members of the hierarchy and other priests as "enemies" of the government.

Anti-Smut Campaigns Seen Gaining

Washington—(NC)—The past year witnessed a large increase in the number of local campaigns against the spread of obscene literature. At the same time, greater organized opposition developed on the part of publishers to a recent literature campaign.

THIS REPORT was made to the American Bishops at their annual meeting here by their committee on the National Organization for Decent Literature. The report was made by Bishop John F. Dearden of Pittsburgh, new chairman of the committee, succeeding ailing Archbishop John F. Noll, Bishop of Fort Wayne, who resigned.

Unclean literature has become "big business" as compared to the clean, for which there is a present, proportionately less demand than ever before, Bishop Dearden reported.

Publishers have created in youth a state of mind toward sex matters and formed in them an appetite for crime stories, the NODL report stated. Reflected in radio and television programs, this state of mind has become so common that parents regard it as natural and pay little attention to it, the report stated.

AMONG "HEARTENING" developments in the publishing field Bishop Dearden noted the formation of a code of ethics by the newly formed Comics Magazine Association of America, representing 24 of the 27 comic book publishers of the country. The Bishop also noted that Judge Charles F. Murphy of New York, a Catholic, has assumed the office of administrator of the code.

Bogota Press Hits Peron Clergy Attack

Bogota, Columbia—(RNS)—Both Conservative and Liberal newspapers here criticized the Peron government in Argentina for its charges that Catholic clergymen have tried to undermine the regime.

La Republica, a Conservative paper, said editorially that "the typical self-love" of regimes which stand on a hollow pedestal of propaganda has become clearly evident.

THE PAPER accused President Peron of trying to "aggrieve" the Church and he prelates and have them submit to the benevolent, sportive dictatorship being exercised in all activities of Argentine life.

It concluded by saying, "Over any material consideration, we are ready to defend the Catholic Church with unchangeable vigor from this gross attempt against her integrity."

El Tiempo, a Liberal journal, saw the Peron attack as a "necessity for political survival." It said that "after liquidating free press, congress, professorship, opposition and the University, he had to clash with priests."

Comparing dictatorship to a snow ball that becomes bigger as it rolls downhill, El Tiempo said: "This is the greatest tragedy of dictators: their career once started, they cannot stop."
