An American missionary sister recently returned from China. She told us of this experience. Each day as the Communist soldiers would allow the prisoners to walk in the prison yard for exercise, they would do two things: first, barely open the prison gate so that they had to squeeze through it with great pain and exertion; second, they would spit in the face of each missionary that passed. That day after a soldier spat on her face, the sister said "M Ko! Nei", which in Chinese means "Thank you". The soldier asked, "Why do you thank me?" The sister answered, "Because now I know exactly how Our Lord felt when the soldiers spat in His face."

As she walked in the prison yard, she began to know a joy like the apostles who were glad they could suffer persecution for Christ's sake. After she returned to her cell she noticed that the tears were streaming from the cheeks of the soldier, so moved was he that she should repay cruelty with a blessing, and insult with thanksgiving.

Evil always increases with retaliation, as when one strikes back after one has been struck. When Our Blessed Lord said "Turn the other cheek" He gave us the philosophy of the abolition of evil. By taking it without returning it, we diminish the content of evil in the world. For all of the obstacles, persecutions and tortures the Communist would inflict on all of the missionaries, would you make a sacrifice of a luxury to decrease this evil—that the world may hear through you "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." The content of the cross was converted in the midst of persecution, and we believe that in the same way, the Eastern world will be converted amidst persecution, and also through your sacrifice.

Third Lecture Listed At Nazareth College

Third speaker in this season's Nazareth College lecture series will be the Honorable Kenneth B. Keating, who will speak on Wednesday, Dec. 1, at 8 p.m. on the topic, "Our

Internal Security" in the college auditorium. The public is invited. Keating has made an enviable record in the House of Representatives, as evidenced by the overwhelming vote of confidence given him by constituents in the recent election—a plurality of more than 51,000—well ahead of his party members.

A PROMINENT Rochester attorney, a member of the law firm of Harris, Beach, Keating, Wilcox & Dale, Keating received his A.B. degree from the University of Rochester and his J.D. from Harvard. He served in both World Wars, advancing from rank of Major to Brigadier General in World War II.

In 1951 he was a member of the U.S. Congressional delegation to meet with representatives of the Consultative Assembly of the Council of Europe; he was a member of the 1954 delegation to the Inter-parliamentary Union which met in Washington in 1953 and in 1954 in Vienna, Austria.

Other speakers in the series will be Dr. Aaron I. Abell, professor of American History, Notre Dame University on Feb. 8; Richard Fettes, Latin America and Communist infiltration on March 8; Lesley Frost on Modern Europe on March 14 and Charles Brady, Professor of English, Canisius College on April 3.

Spiritual Strength Need Of Youth, Says Fr. Flynn

Geneva—While praising the many fine social and athletic programs for young people, the Rev. Patrick J. Flynn, diocesan moderator of the Rochester Holy Name Union, and editor of the Catholic Courier-Journal, warned that "what they need is a strength from within—a spiritual strength."

Father Flynn, editor of the Diocesan newspaper, spoke before the supper-meeting of the Holy Name Society of St. Francis de Sales parish, Thursday, in the school hall to 140 members. The meeting featured the conclusion of a reorganization program undertaken last April. Installation of new officers, and reports on the past affairs of the Society constituted the business end of the meeting.

Installed as officers were: James Ninesine as President; Dr. Charles Mascari as Vice-President; Richard McDonough as Secretary.

SPEAKERS included Very Rev. Edward K. Ball, V.F., pastor of St. Francis, Louis McAnigan, retiring president and hon.orary committee chairman; Anthony Cecere, retiring secretary; Paul Tancey, supper meeting chairman; James Ninesine, newly named president and Father Flynn. Rev. Walter Carron, society moderator presented the speakers.

In his talk Father Flynn reminded the men that as a group they represented the all important source of assistance to their priests that every flourishing parish must have. But as a Society their chief assistance to the parish was in the spiritual strength they represented as men dedicated to their faith "to whom the Person of Jesus Christ is a living reality of today, not a 'was' of history."
