The Fathers of the Sacred Hearts are in charge of Our Lady of Victory Church or the "Little French Church" as it is popularly called.

The Rev. Cathedral Rites To Close Marian Year Observance

His Excellency, Bishop James E. Kearney will preside at Solemn Pontifical Mass, Wednesday, Dec. 8, at 8 p.m., at Sacred Heart Cathedral to mark the closing of the Marian Year.

Celebrant of the Mass will be His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey. St. Bernard's famed Seminary choir will chant the Mass, and Rev. Daniel O'Keefe of the New York Apostolate will preach. Services on Monday and Tuesday will be at 7:45 p.m. in preparation for the fast day.

THE CATHEDRAL rites will coincide with diocesan-wide ceremonies in parish churches and religious institutions bringing the Marian Year to a conclusion. Assisting at the Cathedral Mass on Wednesday evening will be the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfred T. Craugh, Assistant Priest at the Throne; Deacons of honor will be students from St. Bernard's Seminary, the Rev. Mr. Adam R. Smalley and Rev. Mr. John L. Shay; and Rev. John L. Bishop Casey Keynotes Drives For Two Parochial Schools

His Excellency, Auxiliary Lawrence B. Casey this week launches two campaigns to expand parochial schools in the Rochester suburban area.

Parishioners of St. John's Church, Spencerport, launched a fund campaign at a dinner meeting Wed., Dec. 1, to build a new parochial school in that village.

Bishop Casey recited in the principal address that the present 87 year old building has been condemned and is greatly overcrowded. First and second grades are conducted in the hall, so that construction of an adequate building is an absolute necessity.

"The result of a new school," the Bishop stated, "would be more effective teaching, it would attract more pupils, and it will provide needed lunch hour facilities."

Rev. Francis E. Hester, pastor, said that the proposed structure will contain six classrooms and a hall which will serve for parish activities and a youth program. Bishop Casey paid tribute to the zeal of Father Hester and cited the advantages of a full parochial school education over a mere released time program.

Estimated cost of the new unit will be \$175,000 and a minimum objective is a day's wage a month for thirty months from every wage-earner in the parish. At St. John's parish in Greece, N. Y., Bishop Casey is scheduled to be principal speaker at the Opening Campaign dinner there on Saturday evening. Rev. Donald E. Lux, pastor, announces that over three hundred men are set to canvass the parish to raise \$175,000 for a needed eight-room addition to the parochial school there. Already over 750 children are in attendance at the Greece school, and the total is expected to go over the 1,000 mark within three years.

Clothing Drive Increase Seen

Sixteen parishes of the diocese have made their reports to the Rev. E. Leo McManus, director of the Thanksgiving Clothing Collection. A general increase of over 30 per cent has been marked in these first reports, and, according to Father McManus, this trend would indicate that up to seventy-five tons of relief clothing is expected to be sent from this diocese to the world's needy. This represents at least ten tons more than was sent last year.

A complete report will be published in the Courier-Journal listing individual parish contributions as soon as these are submitted to the diocesan director.
