

Father McCorkell Named Pontifical Institute Head

The Rev. Edmund Joseph McCorkell, C.S.B., until recently professor of English at St. John Fisher College here, will become president of the Pontifical Institute of Medieval Studies at Toronto.

Father McCorkell, former head of the Basilians succeeds Dr. Anton Pegis who resigned according to His Eminence James Cardinal McGulgan, chancellor of the Institute.

THE RESIGNATION, according to the Cardinal's announcement, was necessitated by other important scholastic work which will take Dr. Pegis to New York. He will, however, remain as professor of Philosophy. Dr. Pegis spoke here in the Christian Culture Series.

The appointment of Father McCorkell has been approved and confirmed by the Sacred Congregation of Seminaries, Cardinal McGulgan, said. "Well known in Canadian and United States scholastic circles, Father McCorkell was professor at St. Michael's College in the University of Toronto and its head for 13 years.

He was also first president of St. Thomas More College in Saskatchewan and Superior General of the Basilians from 1942 to 1954. The author of some literary and historical treatises, he has been a member of the Senate of Toronto University for 20 years.

Shakespearean Festival Speaker Tells Of Macbeth

Montour Falls — Students of St. John Atonement Seminary heard Dr. Arthur Moore Mizener of Cornell University say that he did not believe Shakespeare attempted to be a moralist in the ordinary sense of the term in Macbeth, as much as to show the nature of evil.

Speaking at the Shakespearean festival held at the seminary, he stated that Shakespeare tries to have his audience actually experience the terror and despair that torments a criminal's soul.

TO PORTRAY this great purpose, Shakespeare has Macbeth commit one of the foulest crimes imaginable to the Elizabethan mentality. Not only does Macbeth murder Duncan, but the crime is aggravated by the fact that Duncan is king while Macbeth is the subject; Duncan is the guest while Macbeth is the host; and the murder itself is committed during "The Innocence of Sleep." Each of these circumstances makes Macbeth's crime one of total horror.

Dr. Mizener showed how an awareness of the terrible condition of his soul develops in Macbeth as the play progresses. The motives of love, honor and obedience which Macbeth desired so avidly, can no longer be enjoyed even after Duncan's death because of the awareness of guilt. From the moment of the murder to the end of the play, Macbeth is in a state of night mare. He is unable to sleep, because in killing Duncan, "Macbeth murders sleep." Nor can Macbeth fully awake to the natural world of the crime, because upon him, "Uselessly Macbeth tries to rub the stain of Duncan's blood from his hands and uselessly he tries to wash the guilt from his soul." DR. MIZENER believes that Shakespeare's leading characters in this play, Macbeth and Lady Macbeth, are truly great since at no time in the play is there any recrimination between the two. Both characters evince a spirit of generosity and loyalty to each other throughout the play. The lecture was followed by question period.

Ideals Of Freedom Make U. S. Invincible-Gen. Romulo

Gen. Carlos Romulo, the Philippines' chief delegate to the United Nations said that the United States must continue to make her ideals of freedom coincide with her deeds as he spoke at the Thomas More Lecture Forum this week. "In that spirit," he said, "you are invincible."

The forum, sponsored by the Catholic Courier-Journal, was held at the Rochester Chamber of Commerce where Gen. Romulo called on America to win over the other nations of Asia in years or even months by the same spirit which won the Philippines as friends over several decades.

The new Pacific Charter—"a devastating reply to Communist propaganda"—signed in Manila this year was "a triumph of American diplomacy" in that direction, he said.

THE PACIFIC CHARTER, whose vast significance largely escaped attention in America, exploded a potent Communist propaganda weapon, Romulo said. By getting the leading colonial powers of Europe, Britain and France to sign the document, he said, American leadership has begun to illustrate to the people of Asia that their future lies with the free world. "The United States is misunderstood and misrepresented in Asia," he said. "You are the unwilling heirs to colonial powers. When you are aiding the French in Indo-China, in the eyes of the natives you are supporting colonialism, and helping to exploit this feeling with propaganda."

ACTUALLY, he added, the United States has amply demonstrated in the Philippines its devotion to the principle that "all men are born free and equal." Instead of using the methods of colonialism, which the hostile island people had come to expect, American authorities amply showed from the beginning that they practiced the freedom they preached.

"But there isn't as much time to do in the rest of Asia what you did in the Philippines," Romulo said. He urged a stepped-up application of all the moral leadership America can muster to persuade one billion people of Asia that our cause is their cause.
