

Belgian Regime Withholds Subsidies to Church School

Brussels — (RNS) — Government subsidies have been withheld from Roman Catholic and other denominational schools in Belgium on the ground that their expenditures have not been properly certified.

According to Catholic spokesmen, Church schools have been forced to borrow 160,000,000 francs to pay their day teachers from last Jan. 1 to Dec. 1.

MEMBERS OF the Christian Social Party, the Catholic opposition in Parliament, said that the Liberal-Socialist government not only plans to reduce State subsidies but has failed to pay even those legally approved.

Leo Collard, Minister of Education, replied that the approved subsidies had been held up because the schools, non-Catholic as well as Catholic, had not submitted proper certifications of their expenditures.

"The previous Catholic government (the Christian Social regime displaced in the last election) never exerted any kind of control of their financial declarations," he said. "This situation has now changed . . . and the first two State controllers have now been designated."

"Should these agree with the demands of religious institutions a substantial advance covering the first six fiscal months of the current year will be allocated to them."

CATHOLIC LEADERS have been fighting Liberal-Socialist plans to reduce subsidies for the Church-operated "free schools." The government contends the reduction is necessary for economic reasons and argues that the former Christian Social regime raised the subsidies to too high a level.

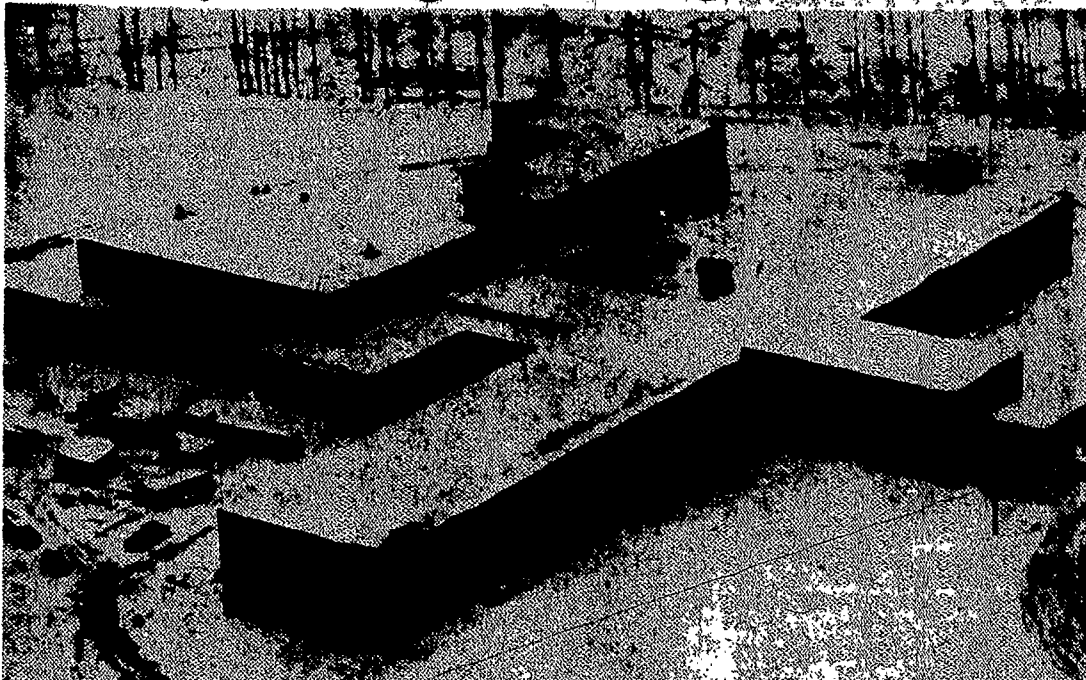
Last month Catholic teachers held a national day of protest. There was a one-day strike of Catholic schools, and Catholic teachers in State schools joined the walkout.

U. S. Priest Named Oriental Delegate

Vatican City — (Radio, NCI) — The Sacred Congregation for the Oriental Church has broadened the jurisdiction of an American priest, whom it named last March as its delegate to refugee Rumanian Catholics in Europe.

Msr. John C. Kirk, a priest of the Savannah-Atlanta diocese, has now been appointed delegate to Rumanian faithful who live anywhere in the world outside their home country. He will be assisted by two counselors who are of the Rumanian Rite and nationality.

Town Board Turns Down Church Appeal

An appeal by the Diocese of Rochester to the Brighton Town Board was unanimously turned down Dec. 17. The Board upheld previous decisions of the town's Planning Board and Zoning Board of Appeals denying permission to build a church and school for St. Thomas More parish on the Drescher estate, 2615 East Avenue.

The diocese had already filed suit Dec. 9, in New York State Supreme Court against the Town, charging that the adverse decision was a denial of "free exercise of religion." A special term of the Supreme Court will open Jan. 11.

Board members have stated that they do not oppose construction of a Catholic church and school in the town of Brighton but do object to its being located on the East Ave. site because the area is residential. A tax-exempt unit there, they stated, would result in "thousands of dollars" lost to the town from taxes on houses which might be erected there instead of the proposed church and school.

Explosion At McQuaid Will Not Delay Opening

A severe explosion in the boiler room of the partially completed McQuaid Jesuit High School injured three workmen, one quite seriously. The Dec. 16 blast hospitalized Sheldon E. McManus of Kenmore, and James Maloney, the superintendent of the school.

McManus was released from the hospital but Maloney will be confined to St. Mary Hospital with a fractured leg sustained by a blow from the exploded boiler.

THE CAUSE of the blast has not been determined. Preliminary investigations have not disclosed the exact nature of the accident which caused considerable damage to the boiler room itself. The most severe damage occurred in the vicinity of the boiler and the brick chimney and flues leading from this section.

Rev. James R. Barnett, S.J., president, said that the damage should be repaired within a few days. The principal, Rev. Gerard E. Fagan, S.J., announced that the accident will not affect the opening of the new school in September.

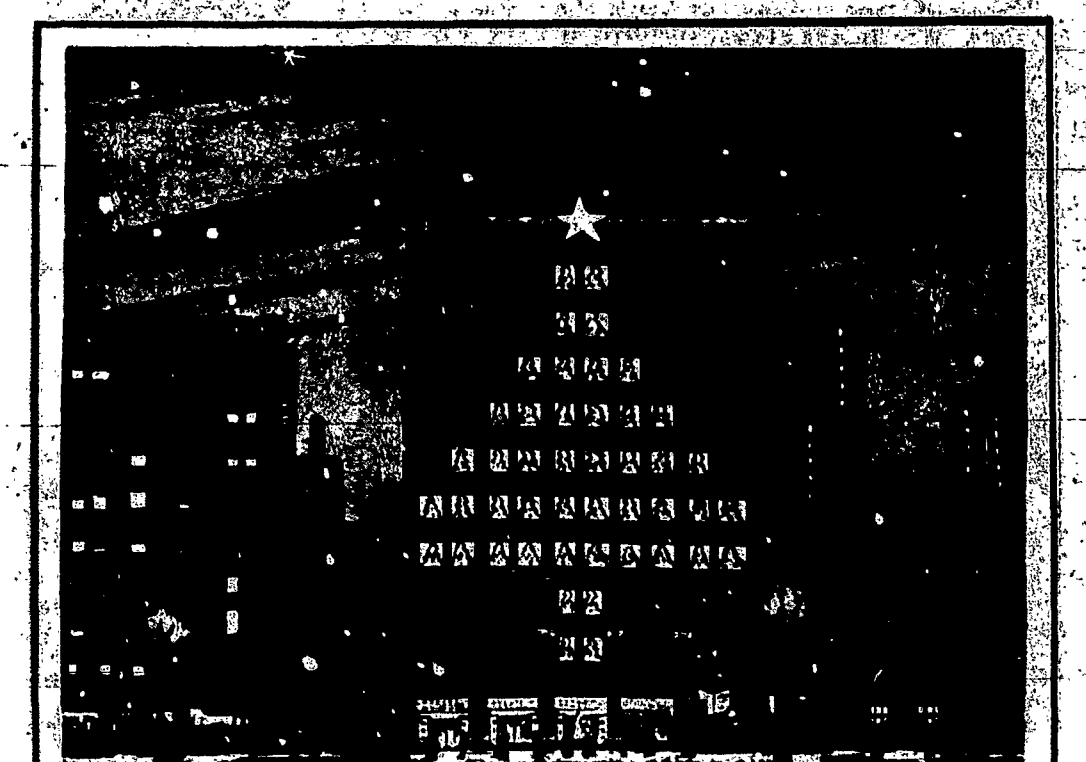
