


Teachers Hold 'Friendly Afternoon'

Spain-U. S. Pact Affects Military-Religious Life

New York — (NO) — The proposed agreement between the United States and Spain on religious practices of Americans stationed in that European country means "we are simply going to obey the laws of the country in which we are guests," Bishop James H. Griffin, chancellor of the Military Ordinariate, said here.
The agreement is entirely in keeping with the United States previous policy in such matters, he declared.
THE FACT between the two countries popped into the news when it was unofficially reported from Madrid that as part of the agreement all Americans under military jurisdiction in Spain would be put under Catholic canon law in matters of marriage.
Government officials in Washington refused to comment on the exact contents of the agreement, but it was authoritatively reported that the marriage regulations affected cases where one party was a non-Catholic and the other a Catholic.
In such cases, Church law would be enforced. In Spain, Catholics is the state church and civil marriage laws are virtually the same as canon law.
BISHOP GRIFFIN said that United States acceptance of the civil laws of Spain was not extraordinary. It has been done in many other countries, he stated.
As regards marriage regulations, the Bishop pointed out that in Saudi Arabia and Greenland, where the United States has military bases, no American may contract marriage. "But complaints haven't been heard about these countries," he said.
The Military Ordinariate is the central office for all Catholic chaplains in the Armed Forces. It is directed by His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, who is

Cardinal Lecaro Deplores 'Individualism' Of People At Mass

New York — (NO) — "Sometimes when I am in a church," says an Italian Cardinal, "I am reminded of the impersonal and lonely atmosphere of a restaurant."
His Eminence Giacomo Cardinal Lecaro, Archbishop of Bologna, commented that the atmosphere at Mass should rather be like a family group, "where no one is a stranger."
The Cardinal discussed the role of the laity in the liturgy in a recent interview with an Englishman writing under the name of Philip Merrifield in the current issue of Commonweal, Catholic weekly review.

THE WRITER had attended a weekday Mass at the Cardinal's home and they were sitting down to a cup of coffee. The topic of conversation: the prevalence of a self-absorbed, individualistic participation in the Mass. Continued the Cardinal:
"A restaurant is full of people all intent on one thing, performing a single general action as a man: they are not so as individuals, as strangers to one another, each person isolated with his thoughts and newspapers."
"Contrast this scene with that of a family meal at home where all the participants have their share in helping to provide or prepare the meal and serve it here all are aware of their relationship to each other and no one is a stranger. There you have the difference in feeling between the church where Mass is 'celebrated' by individual worshippers and the 'church where Mass is 'participated in' as a corporate act of worship, a living prayer, and presence of Christ's Mystical Body."

It was Cardinal Lecaro who in the fall of 1953 attended an International Liturgical Conference and urged the use of the vernacular in parts of the Mass.
HE ALSO organized the "Flying Friars," a group of young, quick-witted propagandists who study Communist propaganda — then in fast cars equipped with loudspeakers — and answer the Communist lies with truth.
In Cardinal Lecaro's Archdiocese all but seven of the sixty communes are under the communist administration. Since he became Archbishop of Bologna he has been leading many veteran communists back to the Catholic Church in a steady stream.

Man, he has made a hit with many of the workers by making personal visits to them in their factories and speaking to them in a simple direct way.
But for the Cardinal, the key to social reform is the Mass, the Mystical Body in action. Says he: "The Mass is the constant and vital reminder that we are brothers in Christ. Without this realization, of course, there can be no true development of social reform."

MR. MERRIFIELD described the Cardinal's own daily Mass. He celebrates it facing his little congregation, which includes most of the 25 young men, — homeless, hungry young men, — who were invited to live with him when he moved into the Archbishop's palace.
All the young guests dine at the Cardinal's table and respond in unison at the Mass. One of them reads the Gospel and the Epistle of the day in Italian; and

Paris — (NO) — Viewers in seven West European countries enjoyed a spectacle of rare splendor and beauty when a Pontifical Midnight Mass, celebrated by His Eminence Maurice Cardinal Feltin, Archbishop of Paris, was televised on Christmas Eve from historic Notre Dame Cathedral.
Made possible under an arrangement between eight leading European TV representatives, the broadcast was witnessed by spectators throughout France and in Great Britain, Belgium, Holland, Italy, Switzerland and West Germany. Participants included Father Agnellus Andrew, O.F.M., official Catholic advisor to the British Broadcasting Corporation who served as commentator for the Mass in Great Britain and translated Cardinal Feltin's sermon.
In London the Sunday Times newspaper praised the broadcast, saying that "this must rank as one of the outstanding television broadcasts of this or any other year."

Among the viewers in West Germany were American troops stationed there.
Employers Announce Family Allowance
Georgetown, British Guiana — (NO) — A plan for giving a monthly allowance to heads of families with more than two legitimate children has been announced here.
Initial impulse for the plan came from Bishop Richard L. Gully, S.J., of Georgetown, who is Ecclesiastical Advisor to the Association of Catholic Employers and Executives. Due to the Bishop's efforts, and the favorable response to his overtures from Catholic employers, the Family Allowance Scheme will start in operation as soon as the necessary funds are obtained.

Notre Dame Lists Father D'Arcy
Notre Dame, Ind. — (NO) — Father Martin C. D'Arcy, S.J., noted British philosopher and theologian, has accepted a semester appointment to the University of Notre Dame here beginning January 31.
Father D'Arcy is one of several internationally recognized scholars who are being added to the Notre Dame faculty under the university's "Distinguished Professors Program."

No Christmas Crib For Ailing Pope
Vatican City — (NO) — There was no Christmas crib in the Pope's apartment this year.
The explanation is the presence of Vatican officials to keep the Pontiff's apartments quiet and subdued during his illness. It was feared that the crib might result in too much movement and about the Pope's chambers.
The crib, set up in the papal chambers on other Christmas evenings, contains a manger scene from Germany by the Pope when he served as papal secretary there.
