

Concert Slated At Coming Glass Center, Feb. 19

Concert by the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra under the direction of conductor George Szell, featuring the Crystal Alan Villiers and Thayer Soule, an excellent film series, and special museum exhibitions, will be held at the Coming Glass Center, Tuesday, Feb. 19, at 8:30 p.m. under the auspices of the Coming and Painted Post Civic Music Association. 

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Family Communion Slated By Ithaca Parishioners

Ithaca—A Family Communion Breakfast in the Parish Hall is being planned by the newly organized Holy Name Society of Immaculate Conception Church to mark Family Communion Sunday in this Ithaca parish on Jan. 9.

Following the 8, 9 and 10 a.m. Masses on the Feast of the Holy Family Jan. 9, all families participating in Family Communion Sunday are invited to the breakfast in the parish hall by the Holy Name men.

EXTENSIVE PLANS are being made under the direction of John Barrett and Carl Yengo assisted by a large committee of Holy Name members. The cost will be the same for each family—\$1.50. Parishioners will be given the opportunity of making reservations Sunday, Jan. 2 at all the Masses.

The members of the Holy Name Society in this parish first project since reorganization hope this will be the beginning of a custom which will grow through the years to promote more active participation in Family Communion Sunday and to create an atmosphere of closer coordination between the parishioners.

Whether or not all families accept the invitation of the Holy Name Society, it is hoped that all families will accept the invitation of the Bishop and again participate in Family Communion Sunday this year. For this is the day to ask Jesus, Mary and Joseph to sanctify our homes; this is the day to rededicate our families to the all-perfect model of family life—the Holy Family of Nazareth.

The writer remembers the first Family Communion Sunday in January 1940 and the many families who happily and enthusiastically took part in it. I recall the intervening years and many changes effected in almost every family I know. World War II and the Korean War which separated members of families in many cases permanently; deaths of loved ones through the years which depleted family ranks; marriages which resulted in new families to take their rightful place in perpetuating Family Communion Sunday.

It is in a truly Catholic marriage with the blessing of Almighty God that a Catholic home begins. The years together with the inevitable hardships of life should bring a married couple not only closer together but closer to God.

In a truly Catholic home where children follow parental example of the finest there must be authority exercised by parents under God, obeyed, and respected by children the same way. Entirely wrong is the extreme of parental tyranny of a generation or two ago and the opposite extreme—entire abdication of parental authority. Today the strength and spiritual stamina that discipline conveys are essentially important. Training souls is the most difficult of the arts as well as the most responsible.
