

Diocesan-wide Clothing Drive Up 36 Tons Over Last Year

Contributing a total of 204,810 pounds, an increase of 36 tons more than last year's total of 154,883, one hundred twenty-eight parishes of the Diocese of Rochester and including three institutions (St. Ann's Home and the two diocesan seminaries) made their final report in the Thriftsgiving Clothing Campaign this week.

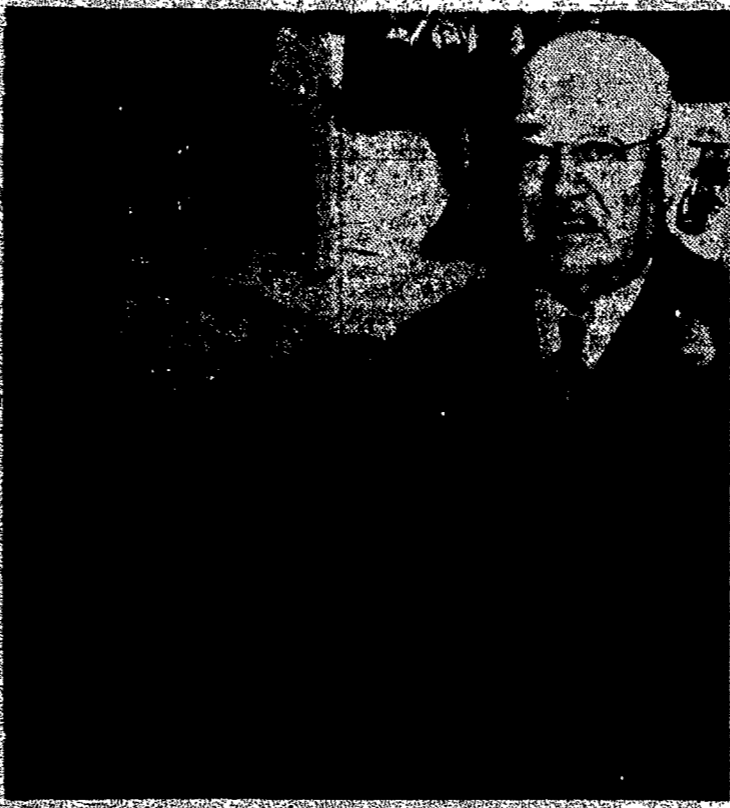
A total of 14,423 cartons were sent to the National Catholic Welfare Service War Relief Services for distribution, the Rev. E. Leo McManus, director said today. Total cash amounted to \$121,560.

Father McManus expressed his sincere appreciation to all priests in the diocese who cooperated with him in the campaign and to all who donated so generously.

U. S. Nuns Find

Okinawa Poor Materially Even Poorer Spiritually

Mawashi-Shi, Okinawa — (NC) — The people of this battle-scarred island are poor materially, but they are even more impoverished spiritually.

This report was made by the first four Sisters ever to work here in the history of the Ryukyus. The Sisters are members of the Daughters of Mary Health of the Sick at Vista Maria, Cragmoor, New York. They arrived here in September, 1953.

"THROUGH THE help of Father Felix Ley, American Capuchin in charge of the Okinawa mission, they immediately set up a dispensary in Mawashi-Shi.

"At first a few patients came to be treated," reported the Sisters. "We were a novelty and people would stare at us in bewilderment until we smiled and waved at them, then they blossomed into smiles too."

Soon the fame of the "Dota-Samas" (Sister) spread by word of mouth and the dispensary became a beehive. Patients cured of their ills often would return with bouquets of wild flowers.

Aside from work at the dispensary, the Sisters visit the homes of the inhabitants, giving out vitamins and milk to the children, most of whom are suffering from vitamin and protein deficiencies. They also give out rice and clothing.

"WE FOUND the people extremely poor and also hardworking in spite of the fact that many of them are sick," the Sister said. "They live in one-room homes which give scant protection from the elements."

Many have grown interested in the Faith and are taking instruction, they added. "Our first home patient was our first baptism."

Okinawa, one of the most densely populated areas in the world, has a total of 600,000 population of whom only 300 are Catholics. The Ryukyus have a total of one million people.

Teachers Continue 'Red China' Debates

Chicago — (NC) — The question of U. S. recognition of communist China is suitable as a collegiate debate topic, it was decided here at the Speech Association of America conference attended by some 2,000 college and high school speech instructors.

A few months ago when the association announced the topic for collegiate debate this season, a number of institutions, including the U. S. Military Academy and the U. S. Naval Academy, refused to debate it.

The teachers in endorsing a committee report said that the question of "diplomatic recognition of Red China is the most popular debate topic and added that it is "timely, vital and debatable."

Marquette Given Grant For Polio

Milwaukee, Wis. — (NC) — Marquette University's Medical School received a grant of \$28,512 effective today, from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, according to an announcement made jointly by Father Edward J. O'Donnell, S.J., president of Marquette, and Basil O'Connor, president of the Foundation.

The sum is the first installment of a two year total of \$40,202 aimed at rehabilitating polio-stricken and other disabled patients in the "rehabilitation center" to be established in Milwaukee County General Hospital.

'Captive Catholic' Named Man Of Year

Yonkers, N. Y. — (RNS) — A victim of Communist official monthly organ of the Province of St. Mary of the Capuchin Order, published here.

Describing the magazine's article as "a masterpiece of the world entered an era of legal, if not real, peace for the first time in many years but said "this precious peace was paid for at the price of a great betrayal."

"With the fading of northern Vietnam to the Communists, it said, 13,000,000 more human beings "disappeared behind the Iron Curtain." Nearly one out of every ten of these were Roman Catholics, making a total of more than 63,500,000 "Captive Catholics under the Communist yoke."

"THE CAPTIVE Catholic," the article continued, "is the purchaser of grace for the nation and the greatest glory of the Church militant. He is a man who follows Christ with a Cross and little else. He is a man restricted in his access to the Sacraments, when he is not totally deprived of them. He is a man who can teach his child about God only with difficulty and often with grave risk."

"We may see this outstanding man of the year 1954 in a Catholic statesman slowly dying in a Polish prison cell, in a Chinese seminary struggling through a forced march to a winter labor camp, in a Ukrainian mother teaching the catechism to her child in fearful secrecy, in a starving Vietnamese unable to earn a living because he is a Catholic. . . . But in every case, he is a man who has made the greatest choice of his time between God and the world."
