The show will continue daily through Saturday, February 5, and will remain open this Sunday for the special benefit of out-of-town visitors.

Surplus Reported By Loan Association

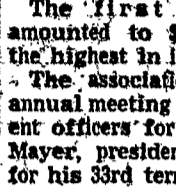

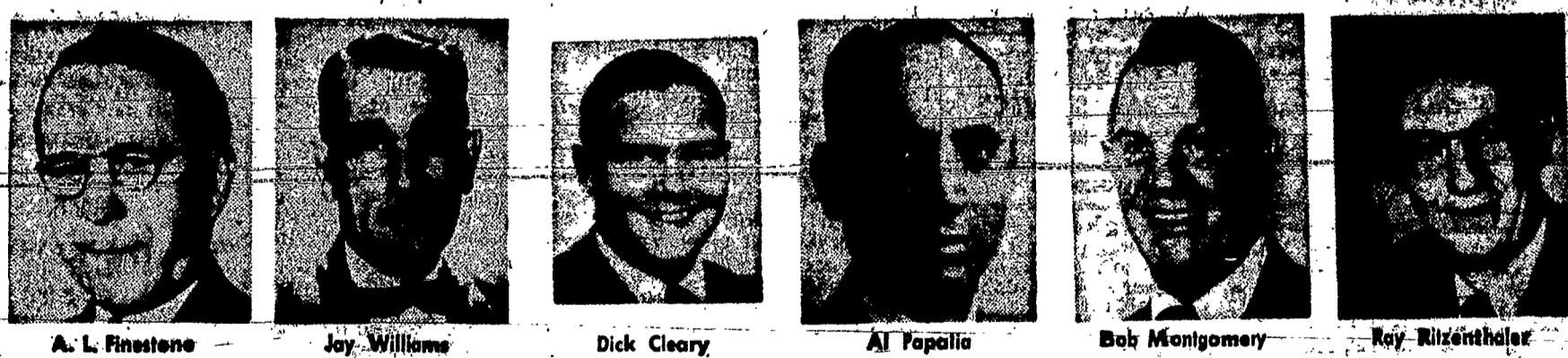
