

## Father Janto Receives Doctorate From Madrid

Clyde—From Spain comes news that the Rev. Stephen Anthony Janto, O.F.M., son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Janto of Waterloo St., Clyde, was recently awarded a Ph.D. degree in the field of Latin American Studies at the University of Madrid.

Subsequent to his ordination in 1930, Father Janto was assistant pastor at Holy Cross Church, the Bronx, New York City, and taught at Siena College, Loudonville, for three and a half years.

During World War II, he served with the Infantry and Artillery in the Southwest Pacific, in Australia, New Guinea, Dutch East Indies, Korea, and the Hawaiian Islands. He also did a tour of duty of three years with the U.S. Air Force, going to Korea in November of 1950 with the 27th Fighter-Escort Wing, the first outfit ever to employ jet aircraft in combat.

BESIDES HIS 13 years of ecclesiastical studies, Father Janto has an M.A. degree in Latin American Studies from the University of Texas. On Sept. 15, 1953, he sailed for Spain to pursue further studies in this field at the University of Madrid, where he has just won his doctorate.

Several months ago his vivid account of Toledo, Spain, oldest and most curious city of all Europe, appeared in the Courier-Journal.

In mid January of 1955, he returned to Spain from a visit to the Holy places in Palestine.

## Religious Education Need Stressed By K. C. Speaker

Seneca Falls — Inaugurating the first in a series of lectures, Rev. Kiernan Hickey, O. Carm. of Auburn, spoke before members of the Knights of Columbus, Council 222, Seneca Falls, on Tuesday, Feb. 8.

Choosing the "Catholic School System as his topic, Father Hickey traced its growth here in America from the middle of the nineteenth century.

Citing the propagandized opposition to the Catholic School which is constantly evidencing itself in the form of proposed legislation and editorials, he pointed out a greater number of these arguments are based on a fallacious interpretation of the First Amendment to the Constitution.

FATHER HICKEY stressed the irrevocable need for religious education as well as secular training in the building of a member of society.

"The Catholic Church is not opposed to the public schools," said Father Hickey, "nor do they maintain that they are Godless." He noted that with Catholic teachers working in the Public Schools, religious influence exists despite the curriculum.

"It would be interesting to speculate," said Father Hickey, "what would happen if, in a city the size of Auburn, all of the Catholic Schools failed to open their doors this coming September."

He noted that with Public Schools already filled to capacity, the problem it would present would be practically insurmountable.
