

# Capping Held At St. Joseph Hospital

Twenty-eight freshmen students of St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing received their caps at impressive ceremonies held in the Little Flower Chapel of the Nurses Residence on Friday evening, March 11, at 7:30 p.m. About 500 relatives and friends of the newly capped nurses attended.

The ceremony began with the solemn carrying of candles, the procession entered the chapel. The students, dressed in uniforms with caps, were lined up on the altar.

The caps were blue and gold beanie caps to be replaced by the coveted nurses caps.

FRANK CERREON opened with the blessing of the caps by Rev. Msgr. William J. Brian, V.P. pastor of St. Patrick's Church.

The class was presented by Rev. Philip E. McGhan, hospital chaplain, who congratulated the nurses on the successful completion of their pre-clinical period.

The students were capped by Sister Margaret Adelaide, hospital administrator, assisted by Sister Anne Maurice, Director of Nursing.

The spirit of nursing as symbolized by the lighted candle was imparted to the newly capped nurses by Miss Janet Butten, president of the senior class.

After the lighting ceremony each of the girls placed her candle at the altar of the Blessed Virgin and that of St. Joseph. Following this, the group recited the Nightingale Pledge, promising to uphold the ideals of the nursing profession.

# 'Nurses Walk With God' Speaker Tells Students

"To be a nurse is to walk with God," the Rev. Robert MacNamara, assistant pastor of St. Ann Church, Hornell, said in addressing 28 freshmen students of St. Joseph Hospital School of Nursing, Elmira, at the capping exercises, March 11.

Father MacNamara said that the time of reception was also a day of dedication.

"Part of the happiness of this ceremony of capping," the priest continued, "is the fact that your position is a beautiful relation of a growing cynicism or pessimistic attitude that nursing no longer attracts girls with a sense of dedication and a deep desire to serve humanity as it did years ago."

"While many nurses have refused such grimness by pen in hand, this simple ceremony is most effective."

"FOR YOU, in the fullness and freshness of your young womanhood have come to the house of God, and in the presence of Him who gave you life, and the parent who brought you into the world, you now offer and dedicate that life to the service of others. You will serve for life, for you will be married for life."

"You may not always be engaged actively in professionally nursing, but there is a sense in which you will always be on call. It may be the health of your own children, it may be the moment of an accident or time of disaster. You, because you will have been trained as nurses, will be expected to step forward, just as you did tonight to dedicate yourself."

"FOR EVERYONE here then, to receive this act of your dedication is heartwarming, for it means that the sense of dedication and the desire to serve humanity is not dead, but vigorously alive."

"For yourselves, the things that you have done here today are even more significant. For the ideas that have brought you to this ceremony, the ardent desire to serve God in the person of the sick must always remain the thing that attracts you to the nursing profession. It is the thing that will keep you going in spite of difficulty, the thing that makes you want to be a nurse more than anything else in the world. What else would have attracted you?"

"IT IS NOT money, you could do well in other fields in a shorter time—not the glamour—even by now you've lost any illusion of that, not the easy work you find. On the contrary since the responsibilities that will be yours will tax your physical and mental strength, only the desire to serve can explain your presence here tonight."

"The better motives and ideals, however, are not in themselves enough to train good nurses. They have brought you this far. But tonight you only begin your

# Marriage As Vocation Discussed At Conference

God and the Marriage and Marriage as a Vocation were topics discussed at the first of a series of Cana Conferences at Our Lady of Lourdes Church Hall, Elmira, last Sunday afternoon.

The Rev. Leo G. Schwab, Our Lady of Lourdes Church pastor told the group of 150 that marriage belongs to God and since they were his creatures marrying is doing the will of God.

Marriage is a vocation and always is something holy. We forget at times it is a sacrament, said Father Schwab.

"Your marriage is as important to you spiritually as ordination is for a priest," he said.

FATHER SCHWAB spoke of annual joy and told the wives to realize they sublimated themselves to their mates when they married.

In many walks of life, he said, if mistakes are made in marriage, try to do better.

Mr. and Mrs. James A. Hall described the formation of Cana clubs which are small groups of married couples who discuss marriage and strive for more Christian attitudes.

Hall said it is possible to form discussion groups soon if interested persons would contact any committee members.

Committee members also include Messrs. and Mesdames James L. Burke, James R. Carmony, William E. Kelsey, Charles J. Kromer, Maurice J. McMurray and Robert P. Muldoon.

Father Schwab's talk was followed by a question and answer period. Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and refreshments.

Cana conferences are a lay movement of the Catholic Church that started in the 1930's and are spreading around the nation. The movement was approved by American bishops in 1947 and the bishops urged their promotion and encouragement in 1949.

The conferences are designed to inspire persons to restore Christian married life to its full stature and develop a thoroughly Christian pattern for their homes.

The name Cana is taken from the marriage feast at Cana where Christ raised marriage to the dignity of a sacrament.
