

### Quebec Hierarchy Score Indecency

Quebec City — (RNS) — A plea to civic authorities, Catholic action groups and parents to "purify the social climate" was issued here by the Archbishop and Bishops of Quebec who condemned the spread of indecent literature in the province.

Auxiliary Bishop Charles Omer Garant of Quebec City announced the appeal following a meeting of the Episcopal Assembly of Quebec Province, of which he is secretary.

He said the Church leaders "view with alarm that obscene and sensuous literature continues to spread all over the province and especially among youth."

The Bishops, he added, "condemn this unhealthy and scandalous press with one voice."

"A false and malicious concept of the freedom of the press does prevail," the appeal stated, "those who change the nature of this who edit this literature and those who spread it are guilty before God and society."

### Virginia High School Admits Negro Pupils

Norfolk, Va. — (RNS) — The Norfolk Catholic High School will admit Negro students next September, it was announced by the school board. It is expected that about a dozen pupils will be eligible.

The action is in accord with a directive by Bishop Peter L. Irell of Richmond. Other Catholic schools in Virginia are admitting Negroes.

In its announcement the Norfolk Catholic School Board said, in part:

"The Church's attitude toward racial relationships is simply that... there is neither Gentile nor Jew, circumcision nor uncircumcision, Barbarian nor Scythian, bond nor free..." The Church must carry on her work among men, and is therefore ready to cooperate with any human society which permits her to go about her work of the salvation of souls.

In New York his busy schedule included Solemn Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral at which His Eminence Francis Cardinal Spellman, Archbishop of New York, preached an address of welcome in Italian, and luncheon with the Cardinal as host.

In Chicago, His Eminence Samuel Cardinal Stritch spoke at a banquet for the Premier attended by 1,500 representatives of the 500,000 Italo-Americans in the Chicago area. Earlier the Premier had called at the Cardinal's home.

Cardinal Stritch surprised the Italian-speaking Chicagoans at the banquet by his command of Italian which he learned as a seminarian in Rome.

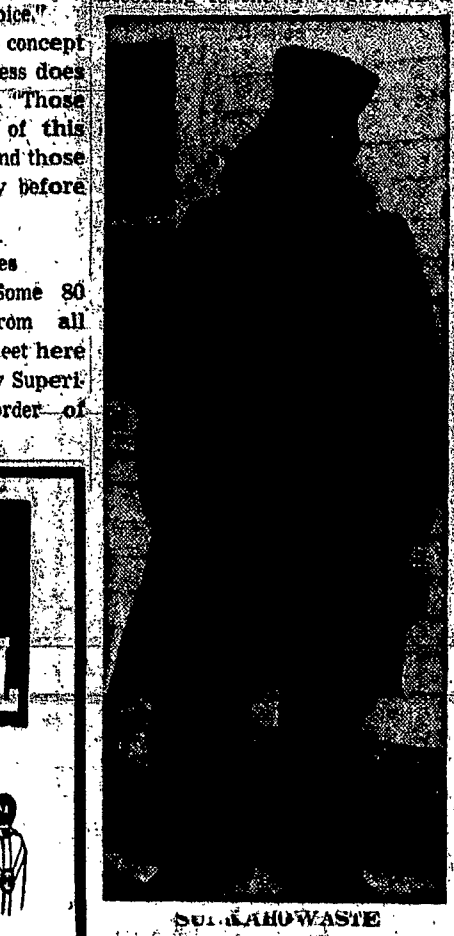
