Fulbright Scholarship Won By Nazareth Girl

Miss Helen Frances Bauer, senior at Nazareth College, has received notice of the award of a Fulbright scholarship for a year's study at the University of Paris, France, from the International Educational Service of the Department of State.

This award is made under the provisions of the Fulbright Act. All students are selected by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, the members of which are appointed by the President. Students are recommended by the campus Fulbright committees and by the Institute of International Education.

Funds used under the Fulbright Act are foreign currencies obtained through surplus property sales abroad. Under executive agreements with the foreign governments, exchange programs offering opportunities for American students are being carried out for the academic year 1955-56 with 23 countries.

The United States Educational Exchange Program is designed to promote a better understanding of the United States in other countries, and to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries.

Miss Bauer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clement Bauer, 47 Westchester Ave., and is a member of St. Ambrose Parish, Rochester. She is a member of the Alliance Francaise of Rochester. In high school she was a member of the National Honor Society and won the regional award in a national French contest. Last summer she studied French at the Middlebury French school. She was on the Gleaner staff in her sophomore year and is a member of the Sodality.

She attended St. Ambrose Grammar School and Our Lady of Mercy High School.

Rochester Blessing Of Babies Set For Bishops In 2 Churches

For the first time on a city-wide scale, infants will be blessed in separate ceremonies at two Rochester churches. His Excellency Bishop Kearney will preside at Blessed Sacrament Church, Oxford St. on Saturday, April 23, from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. His Excellency, Auxiliary Bishop Casey will officiate at a similar ceremony in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Flower City Park, Sunday, April 24, from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.

At the beginning of the ceremony at Sacred Heart Cathedral, Bishop Casey will lead the parents in reciting the following prayer of dedication: "To Thee, O Virgin Mother of God and my Mother, I dedicate my child, and I promise Thee, O Almighty God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, to lead my child in the fear and love of Thee, so that when all souls are gathered at Thy throne, mine may be among the Heavenly Host, adoring and loving Thee. Amen."

Each baby will be blessed individually by the Bishop with the ancient formula, "May the blessing of Almighty God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost descend upon you and remain forever." The parents of each infant will be given a card engraved with Bishop Kearney's coat of arms and a medal blessed by the Bishop as a souvenir of the occasion.

A general invitation to these ceremonies will be given from the pulpits of the city on Sunday, April 17 and will be repeated on Sunday, April 24 for the ceremony at Sacred Heart Cathedral. It is expected that the two ceremonies will attract a record crowd.

Former City Priest Says U. S. Science Respected

"The Holy Father considers the United States to be the scientific center of the world," Vatican Astronomer, Rev. Walter J. Miller, S.J., whose home was formerly in Rochester said in Washington this week on a return visit to the United States.

Interviewed by an NCWC News Service reporter before a feature in his honor at the Mayflower Hotel in the Capital, Father Miller said the Pope "has a great respect for the astronomers of the United States."

The only American on the staff of the Vatican observatory, the priest, came to Washington from Princeton University where he presented a paper before 300 members of the American Astronomical Society. It was the first time a Vatican astronomer had addressed the society.
