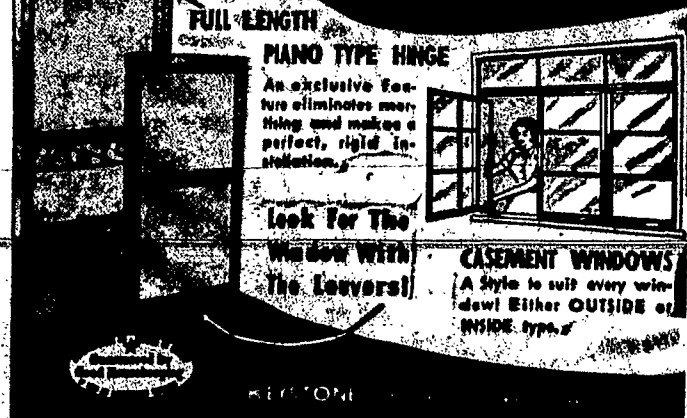
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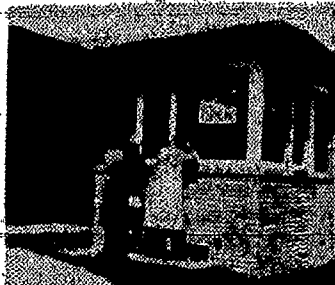

The Alliance spokesman further stated that one of few city developments in the final stages of preparation is located on Burley Road just this side of Chellingham Road in the Lake-dale section. Sewers and roads are now being installed. This development with 40 lots in the first section is being handled from Scaglia and Vaccetto, Inc. owners.

Sam F. Morrell, a member of the Alliance Organization and also a builder, announced that he has preliminary plans being prepared for an 80 lot extension of "Buxton Hills" in Peninsula off Fenwick Road. This tract, when completed will feature lots backing into Irondequoit Creek plus a unique and extensive entrance-way from Burrows Drive.

Another development which is attracting wide interest is "Oak Manor" in Pittsford. Located off Washington Road the tract comprises acreage pro-

duced from the Woods estate and Charles Wilcox, featuring wooded lots in a rustic atmosphere. The entire development will comprise 72 lots and orders for home construction are now being taken by the Alliance Organization.

In reporting plans for the current year, Mr. Brown commented upon the continued and increasing interest in homes, both new and used. While 1954 was the best year in Alliance history, the sales manager declared that over \$2,250,000 in brokers' business to date for '55 indicates over a million dollar increase over 1954.
