**Students, Parents And Study**

A year ago in a study of the habits of students, I encountered in our upstairs hall my seven-year-old son, a figure of substantial physical splendor. If intention and effort could be style criteria. BECAUSE comparisons and contrasts can sometimes be most odious, I do not use this little anecdote for anything but as an introduction to today's remarks. Since almost my entire adult life has been spent with young people, I can say that from long association I have come to certain conclusions regarding young people and their problems, especially educational ones.

STUDENTS, AND sometimes their parents, seem to feel that there is a golden key whereby they can pass high school subjects without studying. But there is none. A student can not solve a problem in geometry, if he does not know the basic principles of that subject; a student can not translate a foreign language if he has just glanced at his first year vocabulary conjugations, and declensions.

And the parent who is so easily deceived or so hopelessly glibly as to believe that difficult subject matter can be thoroughly learned while the student has divided attention always seems to be the one most distressed when the student comes home with failing or low marks.
