Progress Report Made At St. John's Seminary

Montour Falls — The library staff of St. John's Seminary held its last meeting for the school year 1954-55 last week. Staff members include: Rev. Pacificus Von Esen, S.J., librarian; Matthew Velasco, S.J., assistant; Angelo, secretary; Bernard Koelzer and Daniel Horgan, librarians.

In his report to the staff, Horgan stated that "progress had been made in the library in many respects." Since September 1954, over 535 books have been added to the collection as well as 78 albums of records. At present, the library subscribes to more than 70 magazines, newspapers and periodicals. The latest feature of the library was the addition of tapes which will have both an educational and recreational value.

More than 2,500 books and 300 records were circulated through the library, Horgan said.

The seminary librarian, Father Pacificus, conducted a special library course for the staff members this year, introducing them to the more technical phases of librarianship.

The library staff also started a library periodical entitled "shelf roundup" which is intended to provide library information for the various librarians within the diocesan community.

Vermont College Honors Cardinal

Burlington, Vt. — St. Michael's College today celebrated its Golden Jubilee year by graduating 130 seniors, awarding 11 master's degrees, and bestowing 106 honorary degrees, one of them on Francis Cardinal Spellman.

Twenty of the seniors were immediately commissioned as ROTC officers and 14 students received the associate in arts degree in the first two year general education course at St. Michael's.

Cardinal Spellman, making his first official visit to Vermont, was awarded the honorary degree of doctor of laws by St. Michael's president, Very Rev. Francis E. Moriarty, S.S.E.

St. Michael's also conferred the honorary degree of doctor of laws on the Baccalaureate speaker, Most Rev. Russell J. McViney, of Providence; and on Atty. William Edward Coter of New York, counsel for Union Carbide and Carbon Corp.

New Director Named At St. Mary's Hospital

Religious Vocations Gain In Holland

The Hague, The Netherlands (NC) — Bishop John P. Hubers is studying plans either to enlarge the present diocesan minor seminary at Hageveld or to establish a second seminary because of the greatly increased number of vocations in his diocese.

The Haarlem diocese, which covers two Dutch provinces and part of a third numbers 1,200,000 Catholics, representing a 100 per cent increase since 1889. It includes the cities of the Hague, Rotterdam, and Amsterdam.

The number of ordinations while not keeping pace with the population growth, has increased greatly. In the minor seminary there are 450 students now, an increase of 140 compared with 20 years ago.

Druggists To Ban Indecent Literature

St. Cloud, Minn. (NC) — More than 1,700 Minnesota druggists have agreed to start their own ban on indecent literature in the absence of any legislation from the State assembly.

The Minnesota State Pharmaceutical Association, in convention here, recalled in its announcement of the move that it had decided to take action against objectionable reading matter last year, but delayed beginning implementation of State legislation.

None was forthcoming and so the druggists will now strike out on their own. Members will receive lists of literature the association considers suitable, and co-operating stores will refuse to display or sell such material.
