Teacher Shortage Blocks Diocesan School Expansion
Chicago — (NC) — Parochial school construction in the Archdiocese of Chicago is being blocked because of the shortage of teachers, His Eminence Cardinal Stritch declared.
Speaking at the Aquinas High School commencement exercises, the Archbishop of Chicago said that some 35,000 Catholic children attend other schools because Catholic schools are overcrowded and cannot accommodate them.
"ABOUT 14,000 Catholic students of high school age attend other schools and are waiting for Catholic schools to open, he declared. 'Anyone who is a Catholic has a right to go to a Catholic school.'
"There is a challenge to the young women of the graduating class," His Eminence said. "They should give their lives with precious things by answering the call with courage in their souls of 265,000 in the next three years to become Sisters."
"What greater gift is there than for a parent to offer a daughter to work in Christ's vineyard?"
"THE CARDINAL said he would deem a parent inhuman who deprived his daughter of free choice in such a matter. 'Catholic education is going to expand in this country,' he declared. 'Anyone who is a Catholic has a right to go to a Catholic school.'
His Eminence said the Catholic schools in Chicago have an enrollment of 234,000 pupils now and should have an enrollment call with courage in their souls of 265,000 in the next three years.

Pope Stresses
Human Relations' In Industrial Life
Vatican City — (NC) — The growing importance of "human relations" in industrial management was stressed by His Holiness Pope Pius XII in a talk to nearly 8,000 delegates to the World Petroleum Congress in Rome.
The Holy Father, speaking in French, declared that social problems increasingly dominate purely economic ones and that "nobody has the right to isolate himself in technical specialization or administrative tasks."
The Pope admonished industrial managers to pay more and more attention to man as such — not just man as a worker. Employees, he said, cannot be treated as "being in the job all their talents and initiative unless management first of all takes care to meet these deep human needs, that neither a just salary nor appreciation of professional competence can satisfy."
The Pontiff then appealed to a wider sphere he thought that social and moral considerations outrank economics. "The natural riches of a region, country or continent are not destined for the exclusive economic profit of a small number but for improving living conditions — first of all materially but also and above all morally and spiritually — of human groups depending for livelihood on exploiting natural resources," the Pope said.
"It is increasingly apparent that the world-wide character of economics and the duties of privileged nations toward less favored ones will affect the distribution of produced goods," he said.
POPE PIUS told the delegates that by frankly facing this basic problem, they can make a large contribution toward assuring a moral uplifting of humanity which in the first place implies abolishing all individual and collective selfishness."
The Pope also reviewed the tremendous progress of the oil industry, which he said is "inseparably linked to the march of modern civilization."
The delegates from 43 countries cheered loudly as the Pope was carried into the crowded Hall of Benedictions on a portable throne.
Cardinal Segura 'Much Improved'
Madrid — (RNS) — His Eminence Pedro Cardinal Segura y Saez, Archbishop of Seville, was reported "much improved" following the removal of a stone in his bladder.
The reports said the 74-year-old Cardinal was out of bed and sitting in a chair.

Post Office Urges Pornography Ban

Washington — (NC) — The Post Office Department has told a Senate committee that the "steadily growing" volume of obscene matter in the mails is "a menace to public morals, both adult and juvenile" but that defects in the law are "a great obstacle" to department efforts to clamp down.
WILLIAM C. O'Brien, assistant solicitor of the Department's Fraud and Malfeasance Division, said that convictions under criminal provisions of the postal law "have not proven to be significantly deterrent to the growing volume and worsening character" of traffic in obscene matter, "nor have such convictions prevented purveyors of pornography from circulating and selling to children."
Testifying before the Senate Subcommittee on juvenile delinquency, the Post Office Department spokesman said criminal law enforcement is only "a limited deterrent" where action can be taken. But he said that "some of the worst offenders" operate in states where indictments and convictions are difficult to obtain.
"THUS, SECURE in the well-founded belief they are immune from criminal prosecution, or that jail sentences are less likely than fines in their home jurisdictions," he said, "dealers in pornography use the mails to advertise and sell their filthy merchandise to people in more conservative distant states."
Mr. O'Brien said the present law allows prosecution of mailers of obscene only at the point of mailing "but not at the points where delivery is made and where the real harm to the community is done."
Passage of legislation to permit prosecution where the obscene matter is delivered would "greatly help to end the comparative security from prosecution which now encourages, and to a degree protects the owners of many enterprises peddling obscenity to children as well as adults throughout the country," he said.
Complaining of "procedural red tape" which he said hampers the enforcement of the law in other aspects, Mr. O'Brien said court officers and psychologists are agreed that much of the pornography entering the mails is "extremely detrimental to the morals of juveniles as well as adults."
HE SAID that while the Post Office Department receives "numerous" complaints, they represent "an insignificant fraction of those who have just cause for complaint."
"Consequently," he said, "the frequency with which we are now receiving such complaints from parents indicates to me a tremendously wide distribution of obscene circulars and letters advertising dirty books, picture movies, slides, novelties, et cetera, to children as well as to adults."
Senator William Langer, acting chairman of the subcommittee, agreed that the United States must provide "adequate penalties" if the growing traffic in pornography is to be stopped.
