Brainwashing At Home

To us in the Western World, the idea of brainwashing is a particular and peculiar kind of abhorrence. We recall the evidence of this diabolical technique in the unique influence of the school, particularly by the higher secular schools, the testimony of the world-in-which-we-move, and, in a few instances, by their actions upon returning to the free world.
We remember forever the pathetic message of Cardinal Mindszenty on the evening of his arrest, his plea to his people to disregard any future statements he might make, thus tacitly acknowledging that this brainwashing is effective even on the most highly trained and rigidly disciplined minds.
Various theories and scientific explanations have been given regarding the methods used where by a man is made, by speech and perhaps action, to behave in a manner totally opposed to his pre-brainwashing ways. Whatever the procedure seems to be to establish new thought patterns in the mind of the victims.
FABRICATIONALLY, as we refer to the brainwashed victims (as we viewed them on national news telecasts a few weeks ago) while we denounce the perpetrators of such inhumanities and declare that such crimes cry to heaven for vengeance, many of us are totally indifferent to the psychological attacks made upon our own youth, attacks which closely approximate, if not equal, brainwashing.
If the underlying principle of brainwashing is the destruction of the victim's ideals and thought patterns and the substitution of interior—or downright evil—ones we can see the analogy as it applies to the lives of our young people.
There is much in the world today which exists either to wash completely out, or at least to leave no room for, the things of God and the ways of God. In the place of the magnificent ideal of life on this earth as an opportunity to know God, to Love Him, and to serve Him, we often permit our young people to lead lives replete with shallowness, indifference to morality, and a
