**'Charity Essential For
Ideal Nurse' Bishop Tells
St. James Graduates**

Hornell — Charity, above and beyond the demand of justice, is essential for the ideal nurse, His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence B. Casey told graduate of St. James Mercy Hospital School of Nursing Sunday.

Thirteen young women from the School of Nursing and two from the School of X-Ray Technology received diplomas at commencement exercises at 3 p.m. in St. Ann's Church.

The School of Nursing graduates are: Misses Alys Suzanne Jeffery, Marcia Lee Roosa, Mary Jean Quartz, Suzanne Marie Dealy, Frances Rita Sherwood, Mary Teresa Moretti and Alice Mary Schieder of Hornell; Louise Marie North and Helen Marie North, Rochester; Beverly Anne Norton, Canisteo; Marie Ann Costello, Wellsville; Donna Marie Mohar, Belmont; Loretta Lou McMichael, Arkport.

School of X-Ray Technology graduates are Miss Shirlee Lee Latimer of Arkport and Miss Dora Lee Snyder of Canisteo.

BISHOP CASEY, in his address to the graduates, reminded them of the spiritual beauty of the nursing vocation. He used, as an example of true charity, the story of St. Camillus.

"St. Camillus may be considered a founder of the Red Cross. When a young man, he became ill and was placed in a pesthouse for so-called treatment. He was so appalled by the horrible conditions that he resolved to dedicate his life to the sick," Bishop Casey related.

"After his ordination to the priesthood, St. Camillus formed a religious order which was dedicated to the care of the sick and needy. The insignia of the order was a large red cross, a symbol of devotion to Christ, the great Physician. St. Camillus, although

traced with pain himself, spent 46 years in tender devotion to the sick," he continued.

"The secret of St. Camillus' magnificent charity is that he saw Christ in every patient. Unless you graduates have some of the spirit of devotion and self-sacrifice of St. Camillus, you will not live up to the high ideals your instructors hold for you," Bishop Casey emphasized.

He added that nursing is difficult, since it is "not easy to exercise equal charity to the kind and unappetizing; the clean and the filthy; the handsome and the ugly."

"The nurse who brings to her profession true charity should remember that the words of Christ: 'Inasmuch as you did it for the least of My brethren you did it unto Me,' hold a rich promise for eternal reward. May you be worthy of the words of the Divine Comforter," he concluded.

The Rev. Leo E. Lynch presided at the exercises. As each graduate's name was read, she entered the sanctuary to receive her diploma from Bishop Casey. Graduates then knelt, in a group, to receive the Pontifical Blessing, imparted by Bishop Casey.

Music was by St. Ann's Girls' Choir, under direction of the Sisters of Mercy. Miss Madeline Brohm was organist.

GRADUATING EXERCISES closed with solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament, celebrated by Bishop Casey with the Very Rev. Lawrence W. Gannon, V.F., pastor of St. Ann's as deacon and the Rev. Joseph M. McDonnell, pastor of St. Ignatius Loyal Church, sub-deacon.

During Benediction, the graduates asked "Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament for the grace to see Him in each of His sick."

Priests from Rochester and the Hornell area were present for the ceremonies.

After commencement exercises, the graduates and their families were guests at a reception and tea in St. James Mercy Hospital.

**Groups Boycott
Showing Of Movie**

Youngstown — (NC) — Showing at a local theater of the Howard Hughes film, "Son of Sinbad," which has been rated objectionable for all by the Legion of Decency, brought a joint protest from the St. Vincent de Paul Society and the Catholic Committee on Scouting.

The two groups, in a letter to the manager of the Palace Theater, declared that their members would not attend the theater hereafter unless they receive an apology and a promise that no pictures denounced by the Legion will be shown at your theater in the future.

Manager E. C. Prinsen told the Catholic Exponent he had no intention of answering the letter.

**Sunday In China
Priests 'Day Off'**

Hong Kong (RNS) — An Indian trade unionist said here he was unable to attend a church service during the two weeks he spent recently in Red China.

He is W. T. Pinto, one of nine Indian labor leaders invited to Communist China by the All-China Federation of Labor. The group cut short their scheduled tour of China and returned here.

Mr. Pinto said he had asked to attend Mass in a Roman Catholic church on a Sunday but was told by the Communist authorities that churches were closed on Sundays and holidays to provide a weekly holiday for the priests.

The Indian group said they left China early because of Communist attempts to take advantage of their presence there for the formation of a Red-sponsored Asian African Labor Federation. The Indians protested and demanded transportation back to Hong Kong so they could return to Bombay.

Berlin Diocese
Berlin (RNS) — Celebrations marking the 25th anniversary of the Roman Catholic diocese of Berlin will be held here June 19. The diocese, youngest in Germany, was created as a result of the 1929 concordat between the Vatican and Prussia.

Record Response Greets Catholic Hour TV Series

Washington — (NC) — A record-breaking mail response followed the recent "Paulist Debates" series on the Catholic Hour television program.

THE SERIES which was carried by the NBC network and features Fathers John Reynolds and James Finley, Paulist priests, was in the form of debates on the subjects "Need of Religion," "A Sense of Sin," "Confession," and "Marriage."

By far the most moving letter came from a chaplain of a Catholic hospital in California. The letter related that one of the patients was a lapsed Catholic, who maintained he wanted nothing more to do with the Church.

THE PRIEST wrote that he visited the patient on the first Sunday of the series and suggested that he watch the Catholic Hour TV program.

The chaplain wrote the patient he had returned. The same thing went for him. He said that the program was the best thing he had seen in the program and asked the priest to help in coming back to the Church.

The priest said that after a talk with the patient he heard his Confession. Two days later, the chaplain related, the patient died.

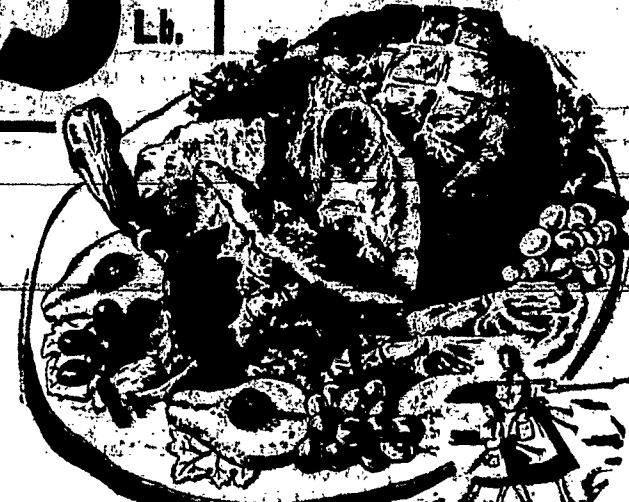
