### Remedial Reading Lab Planned In Corning

Corning—Registration for a Remedial Reading Laboratory, Testing Center and Speech Clinic to be held at St. Mary School this summer, was conducted last week at the school by Sister Mary Helena of Our Lady of Mercy Reading Laboratory, Rochester.

Sister Helena was on hand to confer with parents interested in registering their children in the summer program.  
The 20-day session, scheduled to be held from July 6 to 29, will permit students to be assigned to one-hour periods daily between 9 a.m. and noon on weekdays during July. Regular attendance in the course is necessary for the progress of the child. Children of all religious denominations are welcomed at the Reading Laboratory.

For further information parents were urged to call the principal of St. Mary School, at 6-3234.  
The Laboratory testing program will include Stanford-Binet psychological testing, personality and achievement testing, as well as individual reading and speech analyses. Diagnostic services are followed by guidance interviews, recommendations, tutoring and special group work according to individual needs.

At the suggestion of the State Department of Education the nuns have undertaken this work to help students. Several reliable studies have recently indicated that a large percentage of students would profit from such special training, it was said today. The teachers for the Testing Center and Speech Clinic have been especially trained for the purpose of helping these students.
